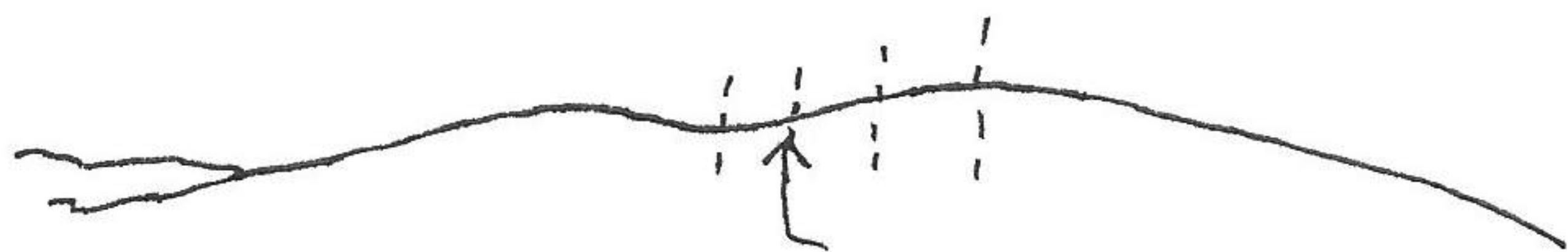

James Robert Bee left with Tom & Georgia Montgomery for visiting friends on Henry Island, NW San Juan Island via the Bee, boat.

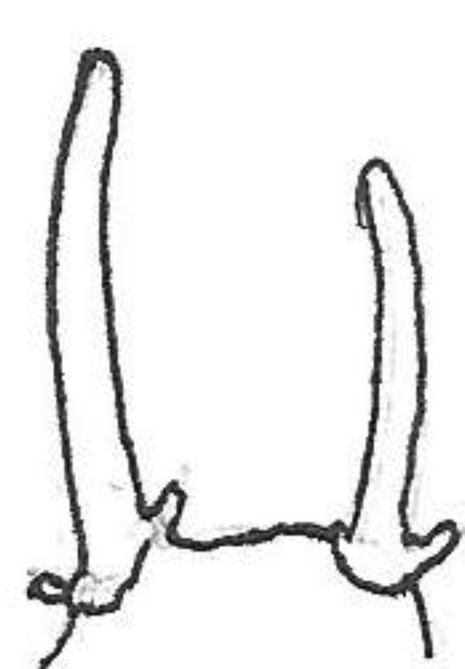

Sunrise 8:00:46 between N & S Thatcher Peaks



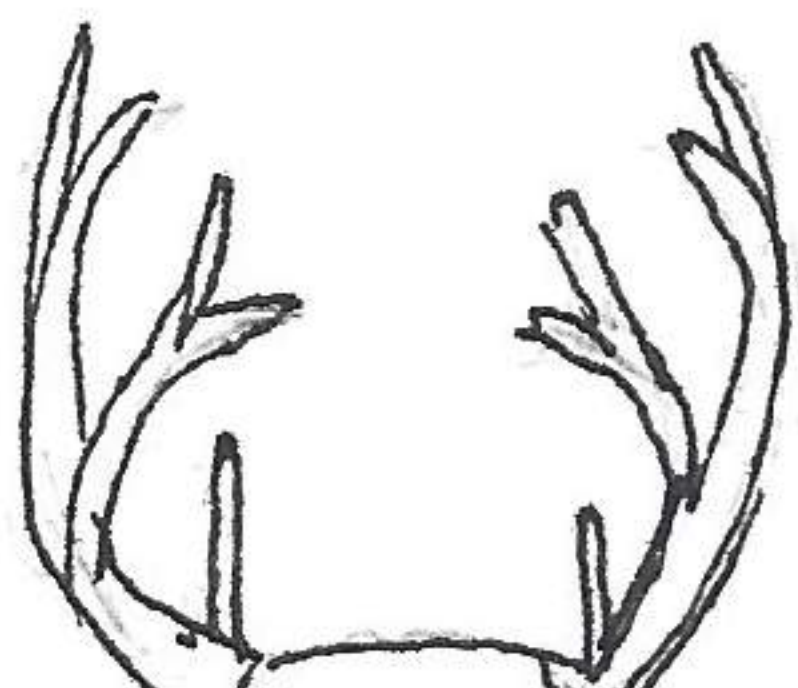

antlers of several ♂ mule deer at feeding station on Bee Estate.



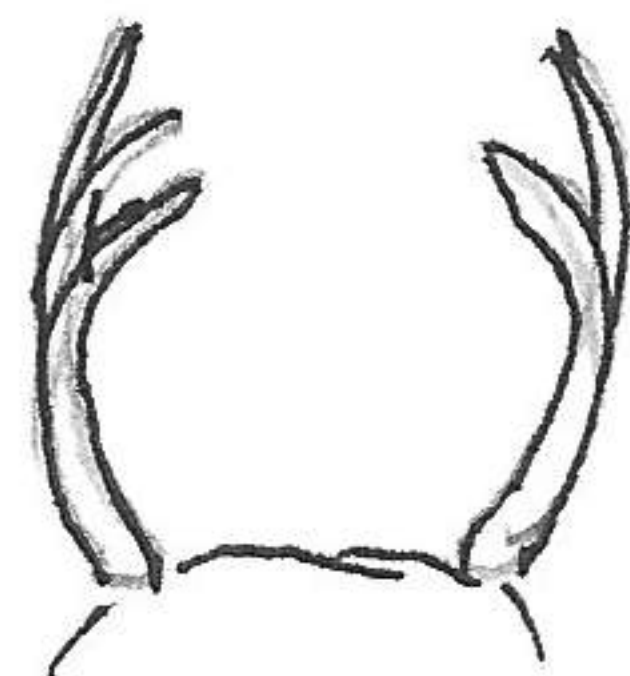

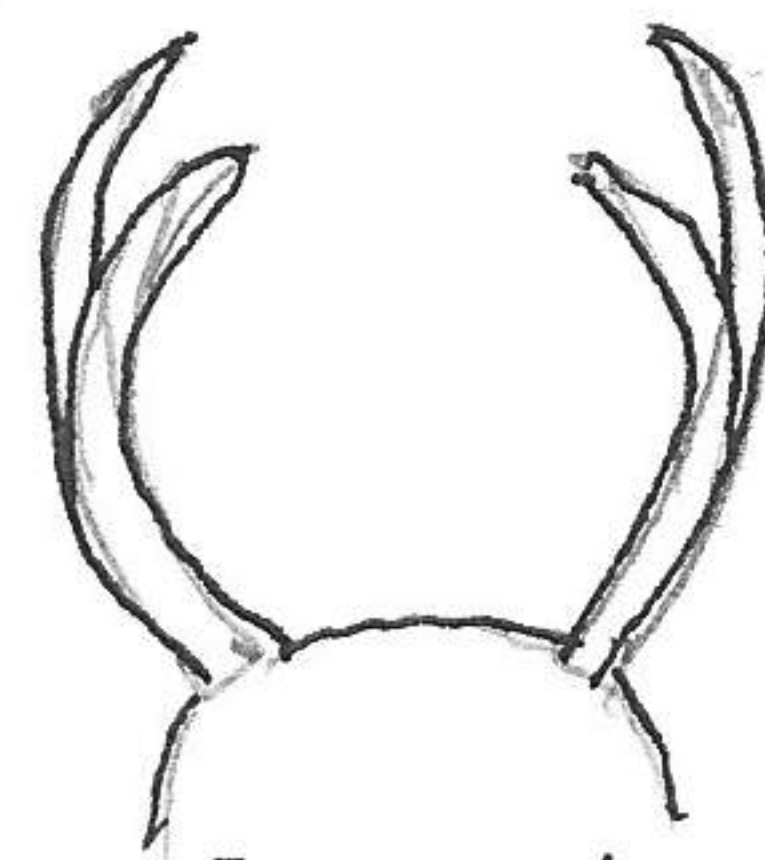

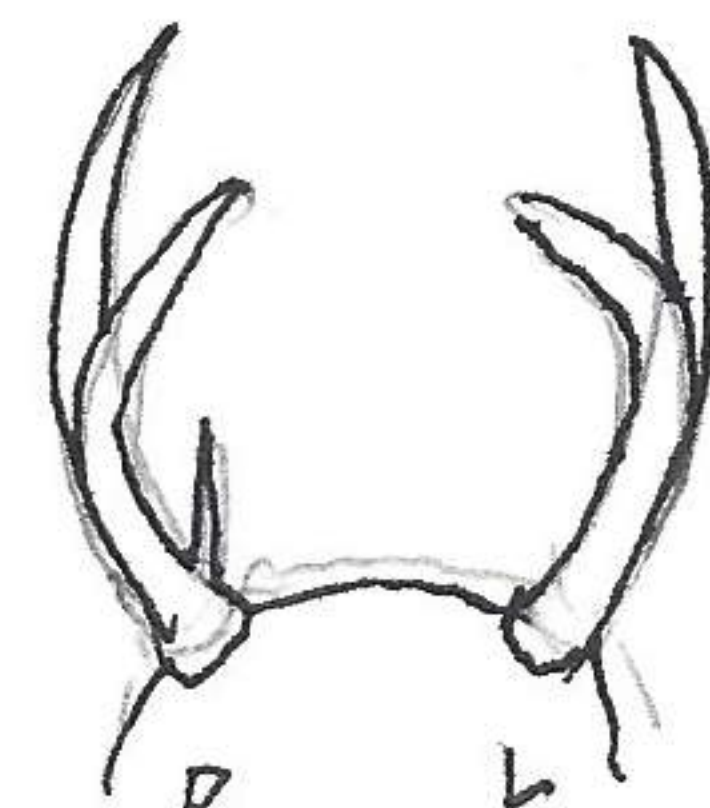

Large ♀ dominant over first year young (her young) and over second year young (her offspring). The second year young was interested in another ♀. Fourth and 5th year young are more aggressive toward their mother than 1, 2, 3 year mule deer.

A young male of the year (antler buds) ran to adult female and without usual odor recognition nursed for 1 minute, continuously.

On the hillside on the NW side of Bee House is a steep, rocky cliff, impassible above but accessible at base. The irregularity at base of cliffs is traversed by a trail carved from basal boulders of the cliff. In no case is there a flat section, either upgrade or down grade. Even the talus is sloped. A three year old male deer pursued a ♀ mule deer along this course. It used its antlers to place the female in mounting position. In the entire course the ♂ chose not to mount the deer because of the non-flat nature of the trail. However a 4-5 year old male attempted in all degree of slope and without hesitency. On each attempt to mount the penis of the ♂ became fully extended. When standing near the ♀ off trail the ♂ intensely stared at the ♀ or in some other gaze elsewhere, then all of a sudden the ♂ dropped head down
