JAMES W BEE

Jan. 5, 1994

At high tide, 22 double-crested cormorants, 18 common mergansers independently fished off Lichen Point. They formed a small wake. They swam as units in different directions and adjusted their group formation by fly-paddling on water within the groups. The common mergansers were the most active and travelled the greater distances.

Jan 6, 1994

To Anacortes and return via ferry. many logs circulating in Rosario Straits

at Bee House ♂^{mule deer} of last year 38" high at shoulders.

Jan. 9, 1994

Out of 12 common mergansers, 2 were ♂. Front Bee House. A dead head log moved from Lichen Point to Dissected Point with rising tides. It remained attached at the latter point.

Jan 11, 1994

In front Bee House were 15 common goldeneye 3 of which were ♀. also 1 marbled murrelet and 8 common murres.

Jan 15, 1994

In N Lopez Sound in front Bee House were 84 pelagic cormorant, 1 double-crested cormorant, 21 common mergansers and 1 mew gull.

This is a season when shoreline beaches erode down to a lesser angle.


Took several presunrise photos of clouds in direction of sunrise:

From 7:50 - 8:15 A.M groups of 11, 12, 3, 28, 8, 14, 13, 58, 8 pelagic cormorants flew, just above water 300' SE Bee House. Ordinarily in A.M. they fly 5.

Out of 34 Common merganser

At approx 9:30 PM a bat with about 6" wing spread flew into outside of window, fluttered down to sill and remained 1/2 minute then left.

16 great blue herons left n end island w of Fisherman's Bay as one group, circled 3 times over bay and returned.

Temp 24°F, wind N 60 MPH, waves 30' swell, 3-4 ft. high, spray to and in forest trees on shoreline.

Mule deer arrived at Bee House 9:00 A.M. Usually in high wind they stay in forest and come next day.

3 double-crested cormorants feeding in high waves. A glaucous-winged gull just Bee House approx 1 every 10' minutes.

Feb. 8, 1994

In S Fisherman Bay Lagoon, half frozen, 1 great blue heron, 42 northern pintails, 28 mallards, 37 western sandpipers, 8 glaucous-winged gulls, 10 American Crows, all in grass SW Lagoon.

Feb. 9, 1994

Mary arrived from Alaska for a week or so. In Fisherman Bay Lagoon, 2 hooded mergansers, 37 common mergansers at 11:15 A.M.

At 1/10 mi E on Port Stanley Rd from Odlin Park turnoff, 1 ring-necked pheasant and first observed in 7 years. Also 1 California quail on same road by 2/10 mi. E.

This A.M. before sunrise took several pictures of brilliant sky and clouds from Bee House shooting SE toward Mt. Erie area.

most common bird using ^{under} outside stairs, ^{Bee House} is the rufous-sided towhee.
The song sparrow and dark-eyed juncos also use this roosting spot.

Feb. 15, 1994

2 bald eagles on ridge of Flower Island.

Feb. 16, 1994

11:00 A.M. waves 21 per minute in front Bee House. no bald eagles visible on nest SE Frost Island or on Flower Island.

Feb. 18, 1994

Eagles (bald) in area, one on Flower Island, the other in same area flew to Leo Reef for 20 minutes then N past Bee House.

River otter in front Bee House diving for long periods of time for food, 5:00 P.m.

Feb. 19, 1994

sunrise top 5 Thatcher Peak. First visible sunrise in last 10 days.

4:00 P.m. 15 harbor seal on Leo Reef, 13 of which were light colored.

2 double-crested cormorant and 48 Common mergansers in front Bee House

16 mew gulls in area, no bald eagles in sight.

Feb 20, 1994

Sunrise 7:33 A.M. near top 5 Thatcher Peak.

4 photos of presunrise clouds SE Bee House.

10:05 river otter swam S past Bee House and past 2 hooded mergansers not over 2' away before the mergansers left and flew out

100'. The otter put-out at Flat Rock to old marking spot of grizzly flat, thence S.

33 mew gulls hunting surface debris in front Bee House.

3:40 P.M. river otter swam N past Bee House.

Feb. 22, 1994

To Anacortes via ferry. Glaucous-winged gulls (25) generally disturbed on Pointer Island. At Anacortes got phone for Sony repair 800-222-7669.

Feb. 27, 1994

10:30 A.M. river otter grooming at grassy swa on Lichen Point. It groomed for 35 min in the dry grass. Another river otter was on shore below Bee House eating some kind of marine animal. It shifts the food from side to side.

2 bald eagles on upper rock of Flower Island. They stood almost touching each other.

Feb. 28, 1994

8:35 A.M. First Townsend Chipmunk of season, day cloudy, temp. 45°F. Waves under whitecap from S.

14 Harbor seal Leo Reef.

March 2, 1994

Townsend Chipmunk observed every day since first observed Feb. 28, 1994

There is some correlation of air temp and water temp. Harbor seal pull-out when air temp is greater than water temperature (cloudy days)

14 harbor seal Leo Reef.

Matriarch mule deer motivated dominant to other degrees of dominance within the herd.

March 3, 1994

No Harbor seal on Leo Reef, low tide.


Mar. 4, 1994

2:45 P.M. 15 Harbor seal Leo Reef. a sunny day and best in several weeks.

1 adult bald eagle Flower Island, 1 ad. bald eagle in tree on Lichen Point. no visible eagles on nest NE Frost Island.

March 5, 1994

Sunrise 6:58:00 A.M.



5:45 P.M. 2 adult bald eagles on Flower Island, one on ridge and one on rock knoll. 8 American crows 25' away. no glaucous-winged gulls on island but approx 300 on E end of Spencer Spit.
 1 harbor seal on Leo Reef Rock #11, Rock #10 about 8" above water.
 6:03 P.M. One of the eagles left Flower Island and flew to and alighted on the nest NE Frost Island. Remained 9 minutes then with other eagle on Flower both left and flew NW.

March 6, 1994

Sunrise 6:58:32 A.M. less than diameter sun from notch.

9:10^{AM}, 4 river otter swam N past Bee House.

9:10 - 19:35 A.M. a ♀ common goldeneye fed approx 50' out from Spring Cove. It remained under water on an average of 42 seconds. a ♀ common goldeneye used same area on two previous days.

Annette and I made trip to S end Thrunder Island in the Bee boat, 6 mi. trip. It took 1 hr and 20 minutes and return in 1 hr and 55 min.

A bald (ad.) eagle left Flower Island and flew to ridge (old tree) on Frost Island opposite E end Spencer Spit. Birds observed on trip 8 glaucous-winged gulls, 76 mew gulls, 4 old squaw ducks, 18 double-crested cormorant 1 pigeon guillemot. On return trip 110 pelagic cormorants on Roosting Cliffs NW Humphrey Head. On trip down averaged 3 miles per hour against wind and 6 miles per hr return with wind.

March 7, 1994

Sunrise 6:54:40 A.M. Sun appeared 1/2 way to middle notch of distant ridge between Bald Bluff and N Thatcher Peak - back ridge notch.

5:33 A.M. adult bald eagle on low rock N end Flower Island. no eagles on nest NE Frost Island.

1 harbor seal Leo Reef.

6:05 P.M. 2 ad. bald eagles almost touching on ridge Flower Island.

6:10 P.M. one of the eagles flew to top dead conifer (Douglas fir) approx. 50' from nest NE Frost Island.

Lights fading.

March 8, 1994

To Anacortes on 7:50^{AM} ferry and return. On Pointer Island 109 glaucous-winged gulls generally distributed.

March 9, 1994

To Anacortes via ferry. At Lawson Rock approx 120 common mergansers, 18 double-crested cormorant, 4 marbled murrelet, 40 common murres, 4 pelagic cormorants, 8 pigeon guillemots.

March 10, 1994

A swimming group of 1 double-crested cormorant, 2 ♂ common mergansers and 5 ♀ common mergansers. Front Bee House.

March 11, 1994

8:30 A.M. River otter swam S past Bee House, 2 violet-green swallows in air at Bee House.

March 12, 1994

^{NG} 4 photos of color clouds at sunrise from Bee House to SE, including full view, zoom, 1000 mm. Water has been quiet yesterday and this A.M. nos photo 940312-2, 940312-4, 940312-5, 940312-6.

7:20 A.M. 2 violet-green swallows in air in front Bee House. At one time 5 were interested in same nesting box^(S) on Bee House.

March 14, 1994

Sunrise approx 2 sun diameters up slope on Bald Bluff.

Birds on Swift Lagoon, 19 shovellers, 14 gadwalls, 2 northern pintails.

Pond at junction Cross and Part Stanley roads, 8 american wigeons, 9 Canada geese, 12 northern pintails.

W of causeway at S Fishermans Bay Lagoon, 5 harlequin ducks, 3 buffleheads, 1 common loon. On E side of causeway, 28 buffleheads, 13 greater scaups, 16 northern pintails.

March 15, 1994

11:00 A.M ad. bald eagle soaring above N end Flower Island.

To Anacortes ^{via ferry} and return. Glaucous-winged gulls generally distributed on Pointer Island. On return trip at 6:40 P.M., late twilight, 30 glaucous-winged gulls on piling at Lopez Island terminal

March 16, 1944

2 adult bald eagles on nest NE Frost Island, one ad. bald eagle in dead tree on low side Flower Island. Time 2:05 P.M.

March 18, 1944

3:10 P.M. river otter swam S past Bee House. Adult bald eagle flew S past Bee House,

March 19, 1944

First violet-green swallows at nesting boxes since first day of arrival.

Wind to 60 mph. 3:10 no seal, no bald eagles on Flower Island. 6:00 P.M. river otter swam north past Bee House with wind & waves 30 MPH.

Stinging nettle leaves 6" high

March 21, 1944

To Anacortes via ferry. Snow in Thatcher Pass, water calm. From Anacortes to Dr. Crowley's office at clinic (ophthalmologist) near United General Hospital at Cedro Wooley. Took several photo of brilliant color of shrubs and plants in front of her building (with Amnette's camera). Continued S to Chris' on Lost Lake, Snohomish Co..

March 23, 1944

Returned to Lopez Island. Along river road to highway 9 snow on ground. An oxbow lake approx 2/10 mi W Three Rivers Camp, observed at least 2000 American widgeons & other ducks.



March 24, 1994

Sunrise 6:29:30 base of trees
6:31:00 top of trees

To Lopez Village: no birds on Humphrey Lagoon; ⁴² new gulls - winged gulls Low Beach Surf Bay; 7♀ 9♂ shovellers, 4 gadwalls, Swift Lagoon; 8 Canada geese, 4 mallards Peckering Pond; no birds on Hummel Lake, junction Port Stanley & Cross roads, 14 Canada geese, 5 gadwalls;

5:30 16 Harbor seal Leo Reef.

To boat to place nests under charts.

March 25, 1994

Sunrise 6:29:05 AM (see A above)

Painted and put n box for violet-green swallows.

March 26, 1994

At sunrise violet-green swallows entering N & S nesting boxes.

Timed submergence common goldeneye in front Bee House, 21 minutes, 20, 20, 26, 22, 31, 25. Deeper waters show longer submergence.

Green wood-pecker active.

In an area of 30' x 30' 8♀ and 2♂ common mergansers fished for 10 minutes or longer.

To Anacortes via ferry. 32 glaucous-winged gulls generally distributed on Spencer Island. Continued to Chris' at Lost Lake. Property n of Chris has been cleared of prime conifers for home building. Of 54 logs piled for hauling away average age 60 years, oldest 68 years. An example of diameter of logs: 40", 42", 43", 38", 42". There were 10 over 40" dia. The tops of trees averaged 1 foot in diameter.

This afternoon Chris & family and Amnette & I to Hauston Falls Episcopal Church Camp. Caretaker said Douglas squirrel piled walnuts out side cabins, then one at a time from the pile to place in storage nest inside cabin.

Returned to Lopez Island. At Anacortes ferry terminal 1 surf scoter, no birds observed to Lopez Island except 21 glaucous-winged gulls on piling at Lopez Island ferry terminal.

March 31, 1994

At 1:55 P.M. at low tide observed following seal; 17 on Leo Reef Rock #9, 16 on Rock #11. none on Leo Reef proper. Rock #10 approx 1 foot above water.

Bald eagle on n. NE Frost Island.

3:30 P.M. W side Causeway S Fisherman Bay Lagoon; 13 surf scoters, 9 glaucous-winged gulls, 2 mallards, 7 American crows. On E side Causeway; 43 northern pintails, 19 green-winged teal, 57 glaucous-winged gulls. 7 American crows. marshes are still brown in color. At pond Cross and Port Stanley roads, 29 Canadian geese, 17 American widgeons. At Swift Lagoon, 35 gadwalls, 8 shovellers, at Humphrey Lagoon, 2 buffleheads.

At Bee House first band-tailed pigeon of spring. Rufous hummingbirds fed on flowers of madrona tree in front Bee House.

April 1, 1994

Birds of Swift Bay. 27 common mergansers 5 of which are ♂, 2 buffleheads, 68 glaucous-winged gulls, 13 American crows. At Swift Lagoon; 27 gadwalls, 15 shovellers, 1 greater yellowlegs, 11 green-winged teal. Pond at Cross & Port Stanley roads 15 Canada geese.

3:15 P.M. Otter fished below Bee House and consumed prey on rocks of shoreline. Made 9 dives in same area. Continued S.

4:35 P.M. 12 harbor seal Leo Reef Rock #9; 13 harbor seal Leo Reef Rock #10.

April 2, 1994

30 harbor seal on Leo Reef Proper, 7 of which are dark.

5:30 P.M. bald eagle on nest NE Frost Island

April 3, 1994

10:05 ad. bald eagle flew N past Bee House. This notation frequently used means that the eagle flies parallel to ^{Bee} house and from 2 feet above water to 100' above water average 60' above water.

Townsend solitaire drank rain water on beach rocks.

10:05 P.M. river otter swam N past Bee House and a bald eagle flew N past Bee House.

From the Island Independent of March 31, 1994 (a newspaper type publication) record information on mt goats on the Olympic mts.

Antje and Keith Gunnar report. "mt goats present in the Olympics as observed by S. C. Gilman, National Geographic, 1886," "1884 Capt. Flattery natives manufactured blankets from wool of wild goats." Seattle Press, July 16, 1890 Capt. Charles A Barnes, member 1889-90 Press Expedition thru Olympics, one goat seen by party."

April 3, 1994

To Anacortes 10:20 A.M. There were 2 log trucks from Lopez Island on boat, one had 18 logs, the other 16 logs. On one truck 1 log diameter 36" (doug. fir) one measured 56" diameter (cedar), 9 others from 30"-50" diameter

April 5, 1994

7:15 A.M. most bald eagles fly straight N or S past Bee House at about 60 feet above water and 20' out from shoreline. One immature bald eagle, however, circled 5 times between Bee House and Lichen Point. At one point it alighted on Flat Point and fed on scraps of debris there. 2 American Crows challenged the bald eagle by striking the eagles back but with raised wings it was able to ward off the crows. The eagle finally left crows and flew N past Bee House with food in talons. For last 3 day 2-3 imm. eagle have been observed, 4 together one early A.M.

April 7, 1994

To UWMC for vocal cord surgery. Stayed Chris' home on Last Lake this evening. Jay from Kansas here.

Collected a shrew-mole Neurotictus gibbi. at Chris' home, Last Lake, Snohomish Co., Wa. no. 940407-1

Chris reports a Canada goose in 2' corridor between Boeing building at Everett and sidewalk, nest with 3 eggs, ♂ nearby. would attack people walking on sidewalk past nest.

UWMC - begin chemotherapy - Dr Thompson and nurse Dr. John.

April 18, 1994

At UWMC had percutaneous endoscopic gastrostomy.

April 22, 1994

Left hospital to Chris.


April 23, 1994

8:22 A.M. violet-green swallows carried a 3" feather into N nesting box on Bee House.

roe deer eating new terminal growth on Douglas fir trees. also new leaves of teasel and other new plants.

To Lopez Village. marshlands still brown except around edge which is green.

April 26, 1994

8:15 A.M. 2 harbor seal on Leo Reef Rock #9 while still submerged. 6 other seal swimming in area of Leo Reef Rock #1 waiting anchor.

8:24 A.M. 2 seal are now anchored on Leo Reef Rock #11.

8:37 river otter 5 past Bee House.

9:03 adult bald eagle displaced 3 harbor seal barely anchored on Leo Reef Rock #11 still submerged. The eagle did not effect 5 harbor seal on Leo Reef Rock #9. It left at 9:12 A.M. 6 harbor seal north Flower Rock

11:40 Leo Reef Rock #7 barely emergent. ~~near~~^{#6₄}^{#7}. Low tide today was 1.8. ^(12:00 PM) many logs and debris in sound

12:00 P.M. 45 harbor seal on Leo Reef Rock #9 & #11 plus North Flower and Little Flower Rock

1:00 P.M. Logs and debris still moving S even though tide coming up. However, currents are trending N in Leo Reef area.

Logs 20' to 6", debris, tree limbs are all oriented in current paths of smooth water.

Common loon first bird in sound except Glaucous-winged gull. Good currents at 3:40 P.M. Low tide allows Leo Reef to dry out on top.

7:00 A.M. 2 swallows flew in area of nesting boxes without entering for 4 minutes.


7:22 A.M. 10 violet-green swallows in area and concerned about nesting boxes on Bee House.

Recorded on this date the pattern of melanoma on neck below left ear. Each area a raised lump of cancer darkened with blackish gray. (see April 11 for date of original drawing). April 18 was the first day with greenish-black BM.

Average of per cent frequency of birds at Bee House. Rufous hummingbirds once every 2 days (no artificial feeding) feeding on flower of madrona. American Crow (1-8) once daily. Rufous-sided towhee once every 3 days. Song sparrow once a week, Dark-eyed juncos once every weeks. House finch once a week. Some days no waterbirds except 10-12 glaucous-winged gulls. American robin once a month. Violet-green swallows 3 times a day, in numbers of 1-3, or groups of 5-10 birds in air. Townsend chipmunks once every ^{other} day. Eastern gray squirrel once every 3 days.

4:06 P.M. 5 river otter swam north past Bee House.

7:19 P.M. bald eagle on nest.

8:05 P.M. Can't believe so few birds in N Lopez Sound in the last 3 weeks.

May 3, 1994

6:15 A.M. First glaucous-winged gulls to roof top Bee House. also first violet-green swallows. They spent 1/3 of their time sunning (with backs toward sun) from limbs of Douglas fir and from roof top Bee House. They preened feathers most of time.

9:00 P.M. 4 river otter swam 5 past Bee House.

May 4, 1994

2:08 P.M. river otter swam 5 past Bee House.

May 5, 1994

2 violet-green swallows arrived south nesting box at 6:30 A.M.

6:51 A.M. 6 violet-green swallows vying for nesting boxes on Bee house.


6:52 A.M. no swallows in area for 3 minutes.

9:45 A.M. A cooper hawk flew N past Bee House of living room
height, alighted 20' N of house for 3 minutes, then left.

Description of this grouse included: red dot above eye (♂), striped tail and black terminal bar, zebra-like stripes across sides, chest and belly, long tail, confiding nature.


