

Two ravens were observed flying in near proximity of these conspicuous cliff formations. On the north side of Chimney rock at base of talus there is found a large boulder that has come to rest upon the slopes. From the base of this large boulder are found signs of prehistoric peoples.

Evidence in the form of several arrow points, both perfect and fragmental, as well as charred bones bore mute evidence of the presence of these ancient pebble peoples or even basket makers. Neotoma nests were observed lodge against the

bottom of the boulder underneath protection from overhanging rock. From Chimney rock crossed valley to the north and visited the prominent cliffs on the east side of the small canyon leading to the north. The cliffs can be viewed in profile from Chimney rock. On way over observed several *Lepus t. c.*, a few rock wrens, one *Coluber taeniatus taeniatus* at base of cliffs proper. This snake was by shrub and attempted to escape into the crack of the limestone ledge.

One *Sceloporus elongatus* (?) very large specimen was partially coiled among the small rocks on top of cliff, apparently it was attempting to evade the wind and at the same time receive all possible sun rays. Normally they are found perched very conspicuously on boulders at base of ledges or on brink of ledge, choosing commanding positions.

The rock layers on the entire mountain side are harboring a multitude of fossils that should be worth of inspection. An abundance of coral species are found here representing elongate forms of zophrentis and a composite coral with structure thus.



After finding no falcon in regular nesting cliff returned to car. Evidently the raven or falcon have not started nesting. Drove to south end of Cedar Valley and collected set of red-tail egg on top of breast above mine shaft. Day windy and few lizards moving. As we drove north counted six sheep herders camp. Country generally overgrazed. Sparrow hawk & lark frequently observed.

Being rather late as we drove past Cedar grove were able to see six *Dipodomys* pass across road. Stopped at John Hutchings in Lethi. He had taken a set of eagle eggs the same day in the low pass on the south side of Sashen Pass. just north of where we were today. This bird had utilized a Salt Lake Tribune paper in the formation of its nest. dated Oct. 18, 1938
