

Represented here were: Butter clam, mussels of two species, barnacles, scallops, cochels, Oysters, teredo borrawings, horse clam, sand dollars, rock clam, razor clams, Amphineura, Crabs of several descriptions, and other water life. Alder, Madrona, Syringa, Sward ferns, Broken ferns, Nally, Kelp, Fucus, Rhododendron, cedar, Scotch Broom were also for common. Collected several representative shells but misplaced them when leaving.

7/1/39. Seabeck, Washington. Still located on shore line at Seabeck. Collected today about 1:00 P.M. three *Thamnophis* with field numbers, (1-7-1-39) (1), This one was taken at the Y.M.C.A. Conference grounds near the pond edge. This area is all heavily timbered with fir, pine, Madrona, etc. and looks much like a Hudsonian zone.

7/2/39. Collected at Seabeck, Washington two *Thamnophis* at head of bay west of Seabeck proper. with number (1-7-2-39) (2). These two snakes were associated together at edge of high tide marks in the coarse grasses. The area was fed by a fresh water spring issuing into the bay from a distant swamp area. Grasses dry and coarse but green looking. Collected another *Thamnophis* here (2-7-2-39) (4).

7/3/39. Collected 5 *Rana aurora aurora* (13 and 14) (sub. sp) at Seabeck. nos. (1-7-3-39) (5), (2-7-3-39) (6), (3-7-3-39) (7), (4-7-3-39) (8), (5-7-3-39) (9).

Taken along the side of a seep bordering the Hood Canal. The spring entered the Canal from the dense underbrush and foliage among the enormous giant firs and other coast trees. The environment seemed secluded, quiet and was thoroughly shaded from the sun. Entered this area after it had rained and coupled with the fact that the ground let one down to his knees, made it a wet job indeed. also took picture of the Canal from the main road looking west and about 3 blocks north from Seabeck.
