

by without inspection? Are the birds movements along the hillside due to their desire for food or what?

Immature bird about size of parents and begged for food in the wing flapping manner. A thrush was seen to return to the top of one ^{particular} rock for five times before it commenced to feed among the boulders, otherwise the approach was made in an identical manner each time it emerged from the bordering foliage.

One yellow-green warbler could be heard working towards the slide and when approaching edge flew across and commenced feeding along, still calling as it fed onward. Five pika called on our approach 3 from this slide and 2 from the adjoining slides to the west.

One had its home at top of slide, one at base of slide and one on east side of slide. The one at the top of slide scowled us from the top of the rock and when we approached it left and disappeared into the rocks.

We sat at its entrance but it did not return. However a little later one passed by just below us as if desirous of returning to the spot we were occupying at the moment. This one is the one accountable for the third one, but it could have easily been the one that

first disappeared into the rock and later found a subterranean passage of escape. Their calls were not common but noticed on one occasion that there was a definite respond of one animal to another's call.

at the time of observation (3:30 to 4:30) the pika were keeping at base of rocks in slide. One large marmota appeared for first time about 45 minutes after our observations started. It disappeared again.

another one reappeared (could have been same one) at another point some 40 feet away to bask in the sun.

This animal was excessively large and extremely fat and moved awkwardly. Heard another marmot, all call to the west.

pika calls normal. Marmots under our observation did not call. They remained on rock until we approached within 40 feet as we left area. Skies clear with few clouds.
