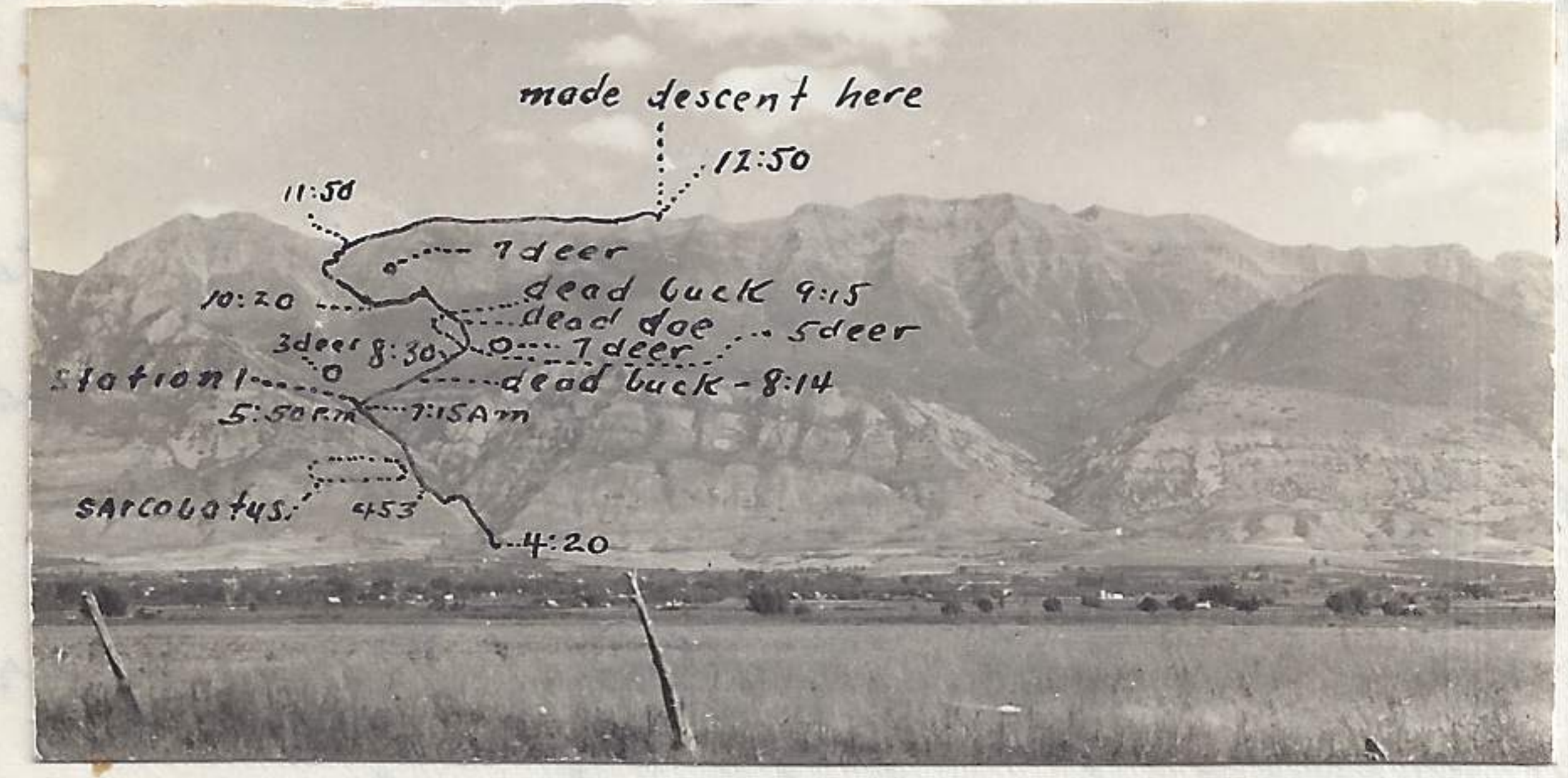


evergreen bushes. The general course took me through moranic valleys etc. Finally returned to main ridge and took picture (2-12-10-39) of the deer territory visited earlier this morning, showing the moranic nature of the erosion and glaciation. Dropped down into camp arriving at 1:20 P.M. Started fire at camp and then went on south hillside & took picture (3-12-10-39) showing the trap route of my previous summer work. Two deer were working up this side hill as shadow began to set in aspens below. It was along this ridge that I followed this morning. Returned and waited at camp for family to arrive for dinner. Bob, Mary, dad & mother arrived about 2:30 P.M. While we were eating dinner one *Tamiasciurus* called & was answered by another about 1/2 blocks away. After dinner drove down north fork and then visited Deer Creek dam site before returning home. Beaver active in Cross River. Beautiful sunset as we drove out of canyon. The most unusual thing about the entire trip was the scarcity of bird and small animal life. Other than the birds actually recorded in the above notes there were no others observed which is rather remarkable due to the distance covered and the number of hours in the field. Very startling considering the condition anticipated. The deer are still confined to normal summer range. Did not observe any active gophers during entire trip on east side of Tmp. while many active ones on west side of Tmp. However, many gophers had been active the last week or so on east side. No eagles or bear tracks.
