

Such probable association as these may appear to look  
 ok but then again one never can be too safe about deducting  
 to for. <sup>Evidence of deep digging at gopher holes.</sup> A flock of about 50 pine siskin flew about the flat.  
 From the point where ♂ deer was grazing followed up main  
 trail to divide of Dry & Battle Creek. arriving here at 11:00 A.M.  
 This divide is another type of divide that makes me wonder  
 as to its probable formation. It looks as if it were formed  
 by winds that continually blew before vegetation had the  
 opportunity of checking the soils movement. This one and  
 many others appear to be almost artificial. From the divide  
 walk out .n.w on horizontal trail to where I could see the  
 conifer forest on north side of Baldy. From here could see  
 the lay of the land but did not see any deer or life except  
 an eagle(?) perched on dead tree on top of Big Baldy proper.  
 The trails here are powered by deer tracks which are found  
 imprinted over the entire surface of the trail. An interesting  
 thing observed so far is the fact that the main deer  
 trails that show recent use are trails that cross the main  
 trail at right angles. That is the trailing is more or less  
 horizontal and not vertical like our own trail we were  
 following. There seems to be a very consistent trailing  
 from the upper limits of the bushy east slope of Big  
 Baldy to the <sup>canyon head and</sup> flats and steeper slopes of the main exposure  
 of Timpanogas. As we would work up main trail  
 in canyon would find a trail crossing our trail. In  
 some cases the trail was an already established one,  
 while in other cases it appeared as if only one herd had  
 passed other new territory where trails did not exist except  
 as they were made in traveling on the hillside for the first  
 time. Would be interesting to know why they trail  
 from one area to another in a more or level horizontal  
 plane. Could weather influence their choice of areas or  
 is it an evening-morning adjustment. If I had observed  
 more closely the direction of print of hoof could have  
 maybe lent a ray of light on the problem. As I recall the  
 tracks led in both direction without any direction choice.  
 Returned to divide and then went south along ridge to  
 top of big Baldy. Here again except near top the deer tracks  
 were lacking in any numbers on ridge trail proper but just  
 below to the last the horizontal trails were found. There
