

*Troglodytes naevius naevius* - 4 singles. This bird and two others are found in the deeper and denser forests where one seldom sees other birds forms. The winter wren and the scattle wren also are found in such a position, particularly the winter wren. Neither of these are, however, as thoroughly at home in the dense interior forests than the varied Thrush.

4/8/43

Trip to Silver Star Mountain and Larch Mountain. Left Vancouver and arrived at mouth of Dole Valley at 9:15 A.M. at point where Yacolt road receives the Dole Valley road. This starting point is between Lucia Falls and Yacolt proper. The itinerary to follow included the following. Canyon to point where Dole Valley Creek and Creek from Sunset converge, hence up Dole Valley proper to head at Silver Star mine, hence east up ridge (Sturgeon ridge?) to top of Silver Star mountain, hence down ridge across divide to top of Larch Mt, hence down logging road to Bear Prairie, hence south and east to Washougal Road, hence to Washougal
