Observed several snow shoe rabbits. We tarried on the peak with only time allowed for a quick pack and descent to divide of Daniels canyon before dark. When camping under such inspiring conditions one finds human qualities in a snow that can not be expressed under our ordinary everyday conditions of life. We both acclaimed the trip highly inspiring and satisfying.
