(600221-1) from front porch at 1620 Tennessee shooting across street Polly & Chris in foreground. about 9:00 A.M. 50 sec x 22 opening. 800 rating

(600221-2) across street from home with Chris & Polly in foreground. most of the photographs were on basis of 800 to 850 rating and from 50 to 120 of second and 22 aperture.

(600221-3) Edgewood road and on front yard of one of the fraternity showing Polly sitting in snow and Chris in background.

(600221-4) Same area as above but shooting into the snow under tree, Polly & Chris on the bench.

(600221-5) Great House of Chancellor Murphy on the Campus.

(600221-6) Front of Chancellor Murphy home on Campus, up a valley to the south.

(600221-7) Tree west of Snow Hall show Potter's Lake area to north.

(600221-8) From Campanile to east.

(600221-9) Old tree just east of Campanile on campus.

(600221-10) Tree at south end of Potter's Lake.

most of these shots were spoiled by improper developing. Red light streaks, green row, and dark blotches irregularly placed on negative.

This season has been characterized by prolonged cold temperatures and gradual accumulation of snows without melting. It has been one of the best years for skiing that we have had in the last 12 or 20 years. James R. has been on skis nearly every day. According to Dr. Hungerford, the entomologist, this year has been an exceptional one. The last year he recalls, to be compared, was 1912. Other individuals remember the years 1912 and 1918 as being years of heavy snow and prolonged cold.
