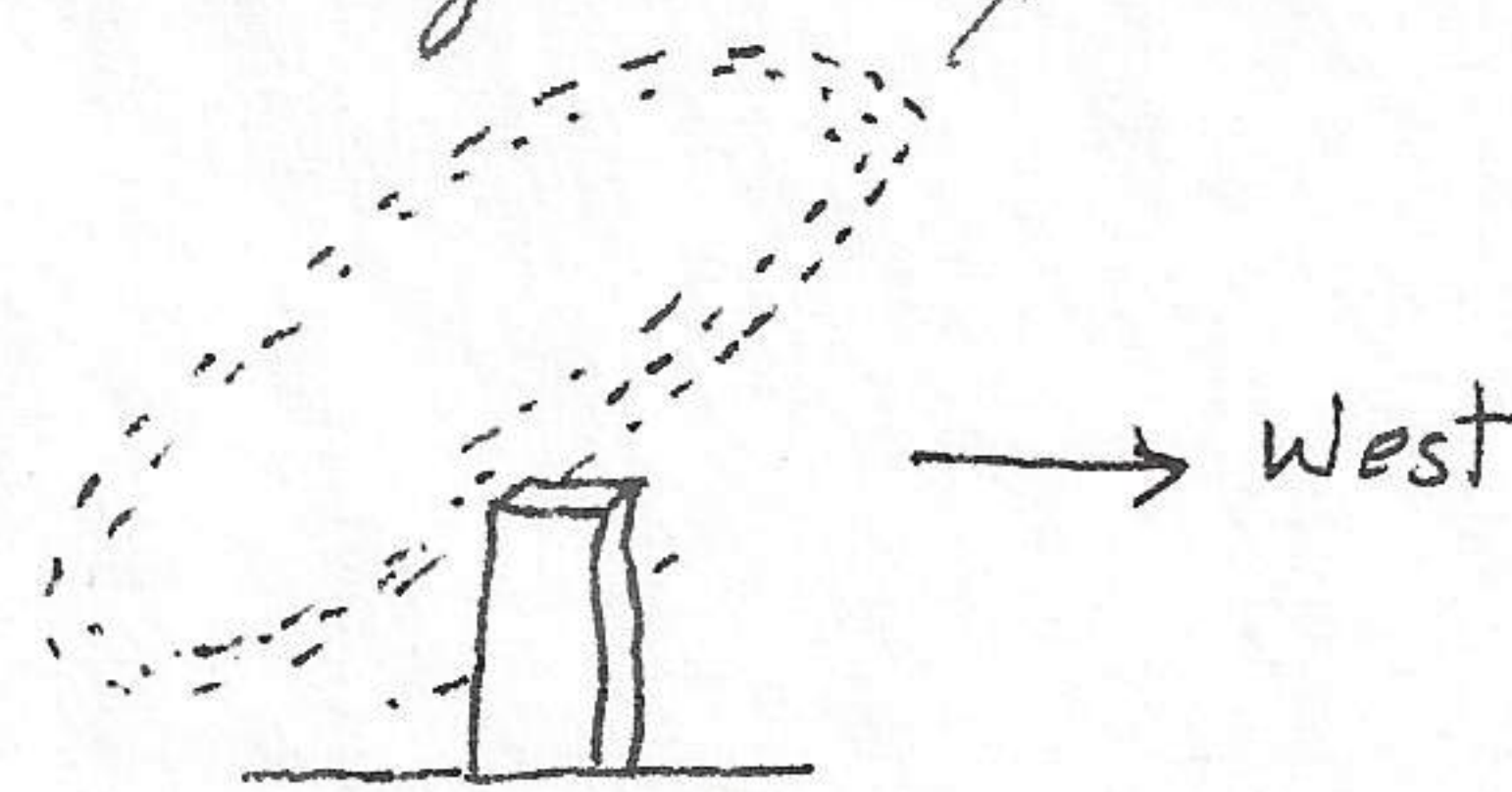

October 2, 1960

While driving past the Centennial School at 6:30 P.M. noted an unusual activity of the black swift. A flock of these birds were circling above the chimney in a clock-wise manner and at frequent intervals a few of the birds would ^{abruptly} drop as actually fly into the chimney. The frequency of birds flying into the chimney was as few as 1 to as many as 20 birds at one moment. The longest interval between birds entering was approximately 20 seconds. Of the 350 birds we counted, 80 percent entered the chimney in approximately 1 minute. toward the end of our 3 minute observation. Three or 4 birds were noted to have left the chimney but probably returned. After the main group entered, three continued circling above until 20 seconds before entering. All birds were in the flock formation before entering the chimney. Calling was continuous ^{outside} until all birds entered. Movement of flock galaxy changed position or rotation from clockwise to counterclockwise only once. Time was late twilight and sky with 80% cloud coverage. Day cool and one shower in the afternoon. Mrs Martin said that this chimney had been repaired only recently.
