Nov 13, 1960

James Robert and I made canoe trip from Lawrence to Eudora via Kaw River. Left 10:00 P.M. Calm, high clouds, general wind from south-east. About 1:00 P.M. wind started to blow and steadily increased. By the time the general overcast had broken and the sun was beginning to shine through, the wind had increased to a velocity that made navigation difficult. Earlier in the morning, we could hear carp jumping up and down the river, in moments of lull.

10:10 1 kingfisher and 1 sparrow hawk.

10:22 1 killdeer

10:30 a great horned owl rested on limb near trunk of cottonwood tree. As we approached it flew down river thru the trees along side of water. As we near the oak again it flew rapidly and straight back to where it was originally seen. After alighting it called several times. 3 killdeers along river

10:35 22 killdeers on sandbar. They were all bathing and feeding as if they had just dropped down to river from migration or long flight as they were more active than other groups that resided along the river.

10:50 mouth large stream - right. Heard 1 red-bellied woodpecker and several small birds.

11:00 Swallow cliffs

11:30 Point along river where we capsized Nov. 9, 1960. Found a cotton glove but not the shoe we lost.

11:45 fork of river

12:00 bend of river. Mud Creek to left at bend.

12:13 n end of river island. 2 crows left island. 2 jays & group of chickadees on mainland.

12:24 end of river island. River approx. 2 feet lower than
