

Inspection of steel trap line in conifers, mainly on moranic bench, was as follows:

The traps were set in trails, holes, at base of Tree squirrel trees etc. in hopes of picking up flying squirrel, martin, albino flying squirrel reported to have been seen here. Birds observed in this conifer association included: Saw-het Owl, Aud. H. Thrush, Flycatcher, W. Robin, R.B. nut-hatch, W. Pheobe, W. Tanager, B.T. Hummingbird (sp.?), Mt. Chickadee and R. Mt. Hairy Woodpecker. This evening reset sample traps in conifers of similar habitat to last nite.

6/24/37 (Cont.)

Today collected a few Citellus armatus at aspen Grove. and mounted them. They were taken by steel trap on peripheral edge of lawn in main park. Their numbers are 88, 89, 90, 91. Also took set of fly-catcher eggs no. 87. Some of these animals are exceedingly fat. They seem to prefer to feed on the grass of the open aspen park. When disturbed they scurry to the edge and remain near their hole in the protection of the weeds or near the large rocks placed around the lawn.

6/25/37 (cont.)

Collected 5 Citellus armatus on the aspen Grove lawn and mounted same. Their numbers are. 92, 93, 94, 95, 96.

6/27/37 (Cont.)

Spent the day in the field making general observations: Located nest of the Audubon Warbler in aspen swail on north side of canyon on Deer Creek Ridge on the south side of the Pine Flat Knoll. The night before had placed 50 museum traps on this ridge and sheep had completely tramped them into the ground as they were driven by. The vegetation obeyed to their command and indicated the direction of herd movement. nearly 100% traps affected. The Audubon nest was located near here. It held 3 young and 2 eggs: nest placed in a
