

Coyotes. Several used Canyon floor or ³⁸⁰³²⁰⁻⁴⁰ trail, ^{gulch as} Woodhouse Jay. One seen and heard calling near mouth of Canyon.

Junco. More than usually seen ranging mainly in lower flats of mouth of Canyon. My guess would be montanus & skiffeldti.

Spurred Towhee. Seen & heard singing near mouth of Canyon.

Jack Rabbit. Three jumped on flats below. ambulated off leisurely.

Cottontail. Several tracks seen in higher levels.

Ground Squirrel ^(mexis). 18 counted on road from the old jumps to where we turned off for Eagle Canyon.

Robin. While working up snow covered slope of eagle nesting site noticed in many cases of stained snow under the mahogany. On close examination found them to be droppings of some bird probably dropped during night when roasting in the mahogany. The droppings were mainly the ^{juniper} seeds, skins, and stained excrement from the juniper berries. Their roasting trees were quite extensive. It is possible that they could be the Robin.

3/27/38 Left home in morning for Brighton for a day of skiing. Harry Thomas, Jack Ruppert, Blaine Carlson and myself made the trip in Harry's car. At point of mountain saw about 150 crows feeding in field along side of road. The road was practically cleared of snow and ice but remained slightly muddy near upper end of course. The skiing was ideal especially the padded trails. Took picture of mt. south of the lodge showing the down hill course covered by the Australian Cassinom and our own Alf. Eugen. The exposure was 1/25 sec and 28 opening.
