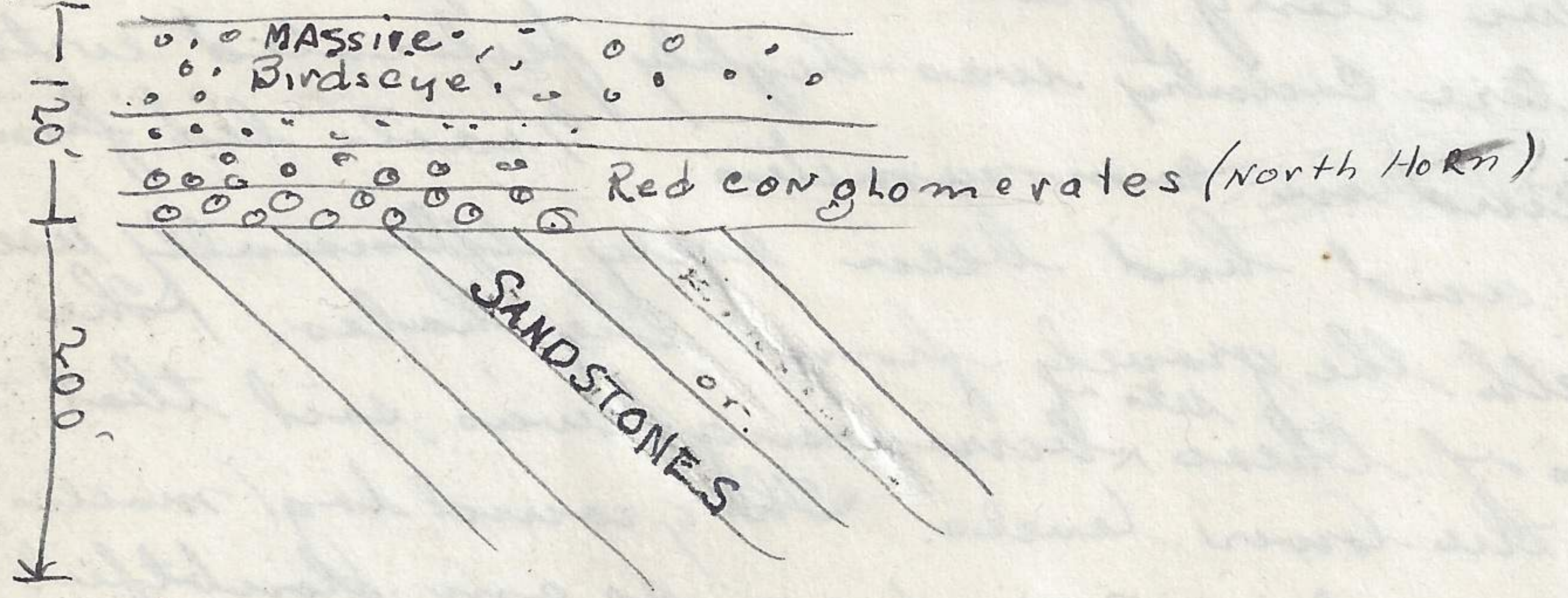


4/4/38. Examined eagle nests in Sable Creek situated in the left right hand fork of Canyon on north side of Canyon 2 mi up stream from C.C.C. Camp. No new material had been placed upon the old structures. The two birds were seen, however, not a short distance from here. Have never seen the eagle nesting at this point before but have assumed they have used the site at one time or other as evidenced from the old fire bows covering the top of one nest. The birds were observed for about 20 minutes, feeding along crest of mountain to the west. One bird lit upon ridge and remained for several minutes then flew or rather sailed with partially closed wings to other side of ^{main} Canyon where it lit upon a rock above some likely looking cliffs. Not the conspicuous birdseye stone but the strongly dipping Permian rocks still further south. Remaining there for some time it soaring in straight line with closed wings to point where it left just 15 or 20 minutes before. This ^{present one considered} nest is a south exposure nest and is very unlikely that it is used by eagle. That is if all previous cliff site are used as examples. The *Oesperomphalus*, Townsend solitaire, and rock canyon wren were found just below cliffs. The contact in geological structures so very interesting here.



4/7/38. Patrol Leaders & myself slept at river tonight. Craig & Blaine making up party. The first bird to sing in morning was the Song Sparrow starting long before daylight. Heard another weird call during night but could not place it.
