

seat for one of the most unusual sites, a snow slide in action. The snow began below high point and continued to slide on surface of older snow until it reached the lower set of cliff when with a roar it plunged out into the air to light far below. It took on the appearance of a water fall except the flow was very irregular, occasionally increasing volume 6 or 7 times along with increased velocity. Two Golden Eagle circled above, one passing, occasionally, out of site when encountering a mist cloud. A black crow worked up ridge and let in *Pinus flexilis* before continuing his journey up into the lands of winter snows a misty looking clouds. One of the pair of eagles was exceptionally marked with white upper tail area and white area under wings. Either a Cooper's or Goshawk also flew by, was flying at quite a height and looked like Cooper's except for size. Took two views from this point, one looking up toward high peak to right and one up cirque to left, leading up from Tompaoneke Basin. Both, $\frac{1}{25} \times 28$. The eagles came from direction of high peak and about $\frac{3}{4}$ distance to top. Left this vantage point and retraced ~~to~~ to old trail and fallowed, ^{back} instead working across the snow field above. Stopped at spring near point on rim of canyon before taking trail to the south. At this spring, the bluebirds, hairy woodpecker, flycatcher (?) and Junco (seen, heard) were seen & heard. The Junco, one of a pair, carried a plant fibre in its bill but dropped it when perched above in a tree. Duck weeds grew in the pond. 200' N.E. from pond, on trail we found the imprint of a bear which had probably passed about 2 day previous. The trail was steep & ^{his} ^{toe} imprints were found at the end of a 2 foot drawn out ^{and sliding} print. Several Coyotes tracks were also seen in trail as well as a few deer. The deer however, had not used the trail consistently because of the snows that still remained in several areas. East of this spring we found an old hawk nest that had been fixed up this year. It was placed in an aspen tree in a grove of aspens. At a point N.W. of spring on prominent point, looking down into Am Fork Canyon, one gets a view of mt. Aspinwall that would be rather difficult to match. A photograph from this point would certainly be a prize picture that would be hard to bet. It is probably the best subject mountain of the the entire mountain range. One also gets a beautiful view of the north side of Am Fork Canyon, the left fork of Canyon, high bluffs, and all intervening country.

Arrived at Camp at 1:45 packed & had dinner & left at 3:30
