

four miles after leaving Legend found *Petrophaps c. deserticola* Cola in road. had been run over by a car but was still alive, so so was preserved. Hail and rained intermittently across the Awapa Plateaus with individual hail pellets measuring 7 m.m., and beginning at 2:00 P.M. Arrived at Torrey at 4:00 P.M. and met Mr. Pettal. While passing through town saw R.S. Flicker, Sparrow Hawk, R. W. Blackbird, Bluebird and Say's Phoebe. The mileage meter indicated that we had traveled 209 miles since we left Gravo. Arrived at Fruita and camped beneath large cottonwood tree just south of Dr. Inglesby home. Still sprinkling occasionally and things looked (like) unfavorable for good trapping tonight. It was the dreary type of rain and the prospects for a clear day tomorrow appeared doubtful. This was our first station.

Station no 1. At junction of Sulphur Creek with the Fremont river. At this point the Fremont river enters the water pocket feature and is walled in with high sides and extremely rough appearing topography. The beds all dip to the east and north and differential erosion has produced a bold rock front that forms a cuesta like form with deep canyon cut into the area beyond the abrupt front. Before the river enters the cuesta front old elevated river terraces help to broaden & lend a touch that breaks the more rugged background.

beds dipping to the east. The elevation at Fruita is 1,000 feet above the level of Salt Lake City.

Toward evening it rained with temperature 54° F ^{after dark} Three *Bufo woodhousii* on ground at camp 300' from water, others heard calling both up the Fremont and down canyon toward narrow.

Set trap line tonight bordering Fremont river just east of camp. Here the cottonwood tree lined the border with squaw bush, boulder and a creeping vine dominating the vegetation covering. Toward the east rose the talus slope of the higher mountain. Rained a few minutes while setting traps.

Station 1 - 6/10/38

Temperature in morning still at 54° F Skies bright and clear.

Trap line of last night.

- 1. not visited. Place in black willow (?) squaw bush stream bank protected with cottonwood trees. 20' from water 20' from base of slope with massive cliffs above. A creeping vine entangled the tree growth and made it almost impenetrable. Sheep & cattle used this area considerable and ground pretty well sloped up, but looked like it might at least support a *Peromyscus* or two. Trap placed under protection of bush or at edge.
