after preparing material revisited the steel & wood trap set for *Neotoma*. Left in same position as last night picked up *Neotoma* (685 J.B) that I had missed this morning but was too far gone and so destroyed. Saw numerous *Sceloporus*, *Cnemidophorus* and *Uta* this morning on route but only one this evening. Thirty White throated Swifts were flying in one pod quite high above the canyon floor. There was a continuous call from these birds as they drifted up river to the west and south. In following the weather through today the skies were clear and temperature high. Towards noon clouds become in evidence and by evening looked threatening and raining in some areas however blue was discernable in the east. Little wind. After resetting woods and steel returned to camp and set out with museum specials to trap the swamp habitat. The meadow visited last night was chosen for one site and a wet pasture west of of Mr. Gifford was chosen as the second site. The first site is bordering the Fremont river and has standing water among the elevated hill produced by the tramping of horses and cows. A rock wall forms the south edge while the road acts as a barrier on the east side. The Fremont river borders on the west and north. The second swamp habitat is more typical, supporting a good growth of *Juncus* grasses and water covers a considerable portion between the grasses. Here the barriers are limited and the mammals have opportunity to move along river or into the adjacent field of gram and alfalfa on all sides. A small water choked creek runs along the east side of field. Back to camp and bed.

* Station 1. 6/16/38. Fruita.

After breakfast gather all traps in as it was our last day at this station. The woods & steel had been put in play for the last two or three days & had not been moved from their original setting.

Woods Steel trap returns.

1. Bait gone. not sprung
