

The grouping within the flock and proportion of immatures to adults is similar but in this group there were more snows than blues. A breakdown of grouping is:

Associated with this group of blues and snows were 113 Canada geese that maintained their group identity. Also 18 coots and 12 gadwalls were mixed with the geese. One golden eye duck was present which seems early for this species. There was one group of 2 adults and 4 immature blues and another group of 2 adult snows and six immature snows. These two groups were separate from the main group by 20 or so feet and when the two groups came together one adult snow and one adult blue became aggressive and fought each other for about 8 seconds. The rest of the two groups maintained their identity but gave support to the two challenging birds. Left overlook at 10:30 These geese were approx. 3/10 mi NW of outlet gates. There were 58 coot generally distributed along base of dam, some on rocks, some in water between the west end of dam and the outlet gates. A raft of about 400 ducks extended in a narrow band to 7/10 mi out into lake and included mainly gadwalls, baldpates, pintail and a few canvas backs and redheads. Only one ring-necked gull flew over the water in the lake.
