7:06 Two Clark Crows flew by. Revisited Lincoln Sparrow nest at edge of Survivor Spring creek. Placed foot on clump of grass, ^{1 1/2 feet from nest} before it left. At a point where creek enters the meadow at Stranded Lake recorded directions where A.W. Thrush songs were coming from. (7:15) Station at a point 400' west of Stranded Lake & 100' from east of the lone spruce at head of Lone Spruce spring. Can hear on west of spring in aspens over hill, one east of Stranded Lake in aspens, one north of rock laden gulch above spring, one directly south between this meadow and Brink meadow. After inspecting traps return to Station 4. No record of frag call during the time I was reuniting trap line.

7:40. Eighty feet south of Private lake on top of knoll the sun rays were just leaving the tops of the spruce trees. Temperature then 49° F. On the south-east drainage of this same hill and 100' south of boulder lake the curly grass constitutes 75% of the vegetation covering in a mottled pattern. This slope drains into Stranded Lake meadows.

Retired at 8:40 P.M. with slight rain for about 40 seconds. Temperature then 48° F. Skies mainly clear but a few clouds on western horizon. Before falling asleep at 9:00 the frags were still going in stretches of about 10 minutes duration, stopping for about a minute before starting again on their ¹⁰ minute stretches. This afternoon I established an Indian ^{camp} site on top of knoll 600' N.W.W of Private Lake from an area of about 30 square feet and coming from a definite dispersal point, picked up an owl and several pieces of arrow points. Other flint fragments were strewn upon the surface. Just accidentally discovered this area when I walked out to this point to watch the changing moods of the desert country far to the south, as the sun sank down beyond the western horizon.

* Station 4. - 6/24/38 Private Lake
First sun rays on top of aspen trees on hill top directly south of Private Lake at 5:32 A.M. By 5:45 A.M. the sun had crept down to bases of the aspen on crest of hill. Robins singing at break of day but no Pseudacris singing or calling as yet. Thrushes started at 6:10 A.M. Temperature 46° F.
Trap line. Museum special trap placed along edge of creek from head of Survivor spring, down to a point 300' below along course. Aspen grows extensive 100' to the east and bordering at head of spring. Grassy hillsides west & south. The ground is wet, or at least damp six feet either side of stream.
