

7:10 Small pond filled with grasses.  
7:11 Vireo singing.  
7:15 Above pond on chokecherry hillside watched Macgillivray warbler feeding and singing. It has 3 high notes and 2 lower notes as its song. Thrush singing.

7:19. Few swallowtail butterflies.  
7:21 On gaining the upper edge of glacial platform came upon two *Callospermophilus* in wet meadow. They were evidently together but each ran in opposite directions to boulder piles 500' apart.

7:21. Vireo singing. Siskin flew by.  
7:24 Robin flew up and over meadow. Two others at edge of aspen.

7:25 Junco, Vireo and Chipping sparrow calling.  
7:26. Thrush singing.

7:30 Junco, Vireo & Robin singing.

7:33 Arrived at Coast Lake at first outlet east of the long meadow to the south. Could hear Chipping Sparrow, Vireo, Wood Pewee, thrush and robin from lake. a ♂ & 2 ♀ mallards left lake. <sup>from calling</sup> After leaving the south west end of lake on trail to camp ran into a abnormal number of damsel flies 2" long. This congregation of greenish damsel flies covered an area about 200' x 100' among the aspen trees, <sup>flying</sup> near the surface of the ground.

7:38. White tailed Jack Rabbit ran down toward Stranded Lake from among the aspen trees. Arrived at Station 4 at 7:45 and heard the Chipping Sparrow, siskins, and audubon warbler. met George ready to return to St. Cr. Station. We stepped over to rock slide north of camp to collect a Pika that was heard here two days ago. Their call is a very low nasal grunt ~~is~~ and different from the call of the pika found on mt. Timpanogas. This pika was collected at 8:00 A.M when half the slide was in the shade of the east bordering aspen trees. It was on sunny side of slide but heard another in shaded section. The mosquitoes on the slide are very annoying but bearable. They ceased their activity two nights ago when staying here at about 8:30 <sup>P.M.</sup> and did not bother me when sleeping. Swallowtail butterfly flew down slide. Among the rocks there white lime looking deposits upon the sides of the boulders in limited spaces.

After bidding George goodbye and good luck on his return trip prepared to spend the day collecting. Planned on visiting west Deer lakes and all intervening rock field with the objective of collecting the pika and Scurus, both appearing to be very scarce. At this particular side of the Aquarius. Was beginning to wonder if they <sup>(Pika)</sup> occurred here for trips to Roger Peck and Donkey Reservoirs of two years and a year ago failed to disclose their presence. So with main objective in mind left Station 4 at 8:30 A.M to work the lower end of Invasion Canyon and west deer lakes with all country between. Directed course around Indian Point to the rock flow area at Invasion Canyon.
