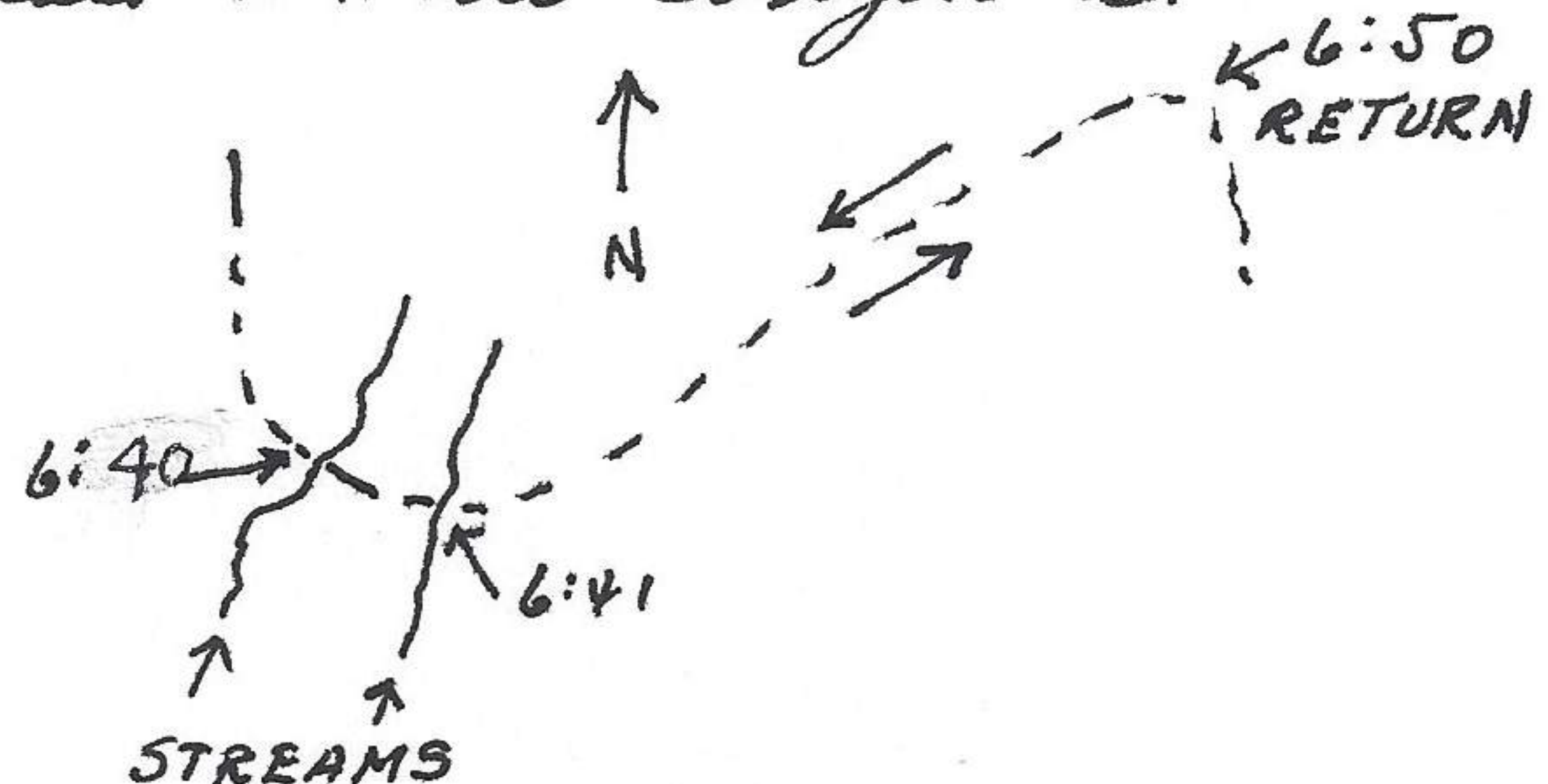


first deer pellets, tracks of deer rare. 6:25 large patch of trail in snow. 6:35 continuous snow patches (winter snow) in trail. 6:38 30' above main creek on W side and major stream over trail. 6:40 log bridge across stream. 6:41 log bridge over main creek. 6:50 P.M. on trail E side canyon at point where it turns S at 100 pulse.

Back at streams p. 68. 1/2 way down 62. 7:20 P.M. greaselike excrement 3/4" x 4" flowers rare along entire trail. Birds rare. Salal and Oregon grape larger at lower elevations



Pulse at trail head at 7:34 P.M. 64. Camp 7:50 P.M. p. at 8:15 62. 8:35 p. 58. 10:20 52 p. Winter snows continuous on slopes to Klahhane Ridge and although snow supported my weight it would have been too late in evening to continue beyond 6:50 P.M. miles of trail covered 1.3 mi. from trail head.

Heart of the Hills, Olympic Natl Park, Washington
April 29, 1982

118/50 p. 50. min. temp 28°F. At camp made first photo of trip number 820429-1 of patch of skunk cabbage which is one of the first plants to flower. Most of the skunk flowers are associated with damp to wet places. a ♂ & ♀ mallard inhabited this body of water for the last 2 days. male occasionally left for several hours at a time. One could pass by at 8 feet and these two ducks would either swim to other side of picture or if in a channel of running water would fly 20 or so feet to more protective places. Annette and I walked up main road towards Hurricane Ridge. Road not open to car traffic because of snow on upper part of road. Left at 9:37 A.M. Orange bellied salamander in road. yesterday picked up one on trail alive but barely able to move because of cold weather. Oregon juncos 1, 3 robins, robin, mountain beaver diggings, 2 robins, red shafted flicker, robin, Canada jay, Stellers jay, roven (these birds recorded as observed. 10:01 first snow patch in road, robin, 15 Oregon juncos, 10:10 first right turn, roven. Moss on trees perpendicular of S side of trees and at an angle on N. side. No flowers. 10:20 second right turn. 10:25 pileated woodpecker holes
