

just W of railroad bridge measured young *Atellus variegatus* at 237.5 mm. total length. arrived water flume or duct at 10:05 A.M. Started to rain ^{at petroglyph site.} with massive black clouds pushing onto Provo Peak to S. Rain clouds & ^{abrupt} weather from W. winds at petroglyph site blowing so hard that one could hardly stand against them and rain painfully beating ones face and hands. Just before it started to rain but during the high winds an adult golden eagle sailed directly over petroglyph site from the upper slopes of Mt. Timpanogas and glided down slope all the way toward cliffs (anticline) on S side of Provo River. It appeared that it was trying to maintain altitude and fly directly S, probably to nest in Rock Canyon but was forced to take refuge in Provo Canyon. The swallows in area disappeared but after strong winds subsided, hundreds of them in continuous flight passed site flying W or down canyon. As the weather closed in it made field work at the petroglyph site unprofitable. ^{Later the weather cleared but left new snow on top Timp.} I was going to complete photography of rest of petroglyphs. Returned to car in Canyon Glen at 12:00 P.M. at park. (Canyon Glen) met one group of 8 Western tanager, one towhee and 3 black-headed grosbeaks. Left at mileage 435.8 for Pale Canyon where I expected to record general site (petroglyphs). From the lower reaches of pale canyon, from road took for photos showing petroglyph site (Stranded Valley site):

Photo 820601-1 to 7 E showing site between the upper canal and metal pipeline. The site is E of the two erosion streaks made from canal breaking thru above. Mouth Stranded valley above valley (Stranded) proper. This valley should have some interesting stratigraphy in valley proper, and maybe a natural trap for old animal remains, washed in at a time when valley was part of the Provo Canyon floor. One can see lower W valley with off-road tracks, middle ridge and E ridge.

Photo 820601-3 Stranded Valley Petroglyph Site in lower left side and extension or continuation of Provo Canyon to E or right. The old Indian trail traversed the slope N of Provo River to first cliff barrier and then the hunting trail probably gained Stewart Flat area via traverse up ridge to N probably
