

side of canyon found numerous *Neotoma* homes. One was constructed of juniper pine and artemisia stems (dry) with chips of shale and pine cones. One stick measured 13" long and 2" wide and 1/2" thick. The accumulation was packed under protection of rock and measured 5' long and 2' high. At point where there is a division in canyon saw a jock in gulch, two house finches and another small group of Western Gnatcatchers. Decided to return to camp and pack mammals and birds collected last night and to preparing the material collected so far this morning. While working along north side of canyon on return trip attempted to run down Eutamias but was foiled by its attempts in escaping. Passed moki house on point to find that it represents two parallel walls only. Land has already be razed. Camp at 12:00 with Temperature 77° F. Took care of material and soon back on trail of the wild chipmunks. Our objects this morning was to procure series of Eutamias regardless of hardship or energy, and so far we have not been able to catch up with them, but we ^{are} still ^{going to} allow 4 hours of the time we should be spending on the trail to Indian Gulch in hunting down these forms. Left cave and gained mesa top hence to head of ^{moki} Tanks Canyon. A few ponderosa are found at the head of this short canyon. Directly west of moki Tanks beyond the upper rim of blind head are located several small potholes that supported fine rain water of last night's storm. Two Eutamias were seen at the head of this canyon. These two chipmunks were on edge of canyon rim and when approached would run as long as it was chased, never choosing to hide among the rocks. Frequently they would lead one up a steep hillside and when at top would cease their calling and disappear. Their continuous calling was all that kept us on their trail. Followed up this canyon and saw two more Eutamias and one Citellus g. grammurus. The chipmunks were on rim of wash and ran ahead when approached. The Citellus was in bottom of canyon and ran up east side of wash to hole among rocks. Another Eutamias on rim of wash but ran out of site. By now we could see our mistake but now we had a plan in which we should be able to procure our specimens. Now we find that they are found on the rims of the washes that are cut down through the mesa-like areas, so when we saw our next Eutamias running ahead along rim I stopped and remained with gun while George circled out around and intercepted its path. It then started back along rim toward my position chasing the chipmunk directly into the barrel of my gun. Collected the above at 1:20 (799 J.B). From here crossed the more or less flat mesa to base of Chimle below the prominent wingate formation. Examined a pile of horse dung
