

than are recorded in census. The valley E of hogback also has extensive prairie dog towns. 655.8 Moffit Co in Colorado. Mounds of prairie dogs more numerous at base of hogback than in center of valley. Rabbit road kill. 666.9 3 magpies eating road kill, 2 live ones near by. 668.5 Dinosaur City limits. Prairie dogs at least here, End of census until indicated. 662.5 prairie dogs still along highway, both mounds and live ones. 664.7 prairie dog standing on side of road, mounds still present. 3 magpies since Colorado border. 665.8 live prairie dogs and mounds still present. 667.2 turn off to Blue Mountain. some prairie dogs as we go S down this valley. Will keep complete census. 672.2 cottontail road kill. Few prairie dogs in this direction. 674.2 few prairie dog mounds and live ones and increasing in numbers as we continue in this valley. 676.9 4 Brewer blackbirds. 678.0 now on highway 64 693.5 all along white river the willows seem to be dead. White River a good meander river. water flood stage. Unusual that there are not more magpies in this canyon. no prairie dogs in white canyon. mainly because entire canyon floor is cultivated. 697.3 golden mantled ground squirrel. Some robins, no magpies and occasional Brewer blackbirds. From this point on thru Colorado and Wyoming & Nebraska, recorder malfunction, so with few notebook notations and from recollection (To Big Springs) Nebraska make the following entries. As I recall I was to make complete census across Colorado and Wyoming.

Continued on highway 64 to Meeker, thence N on 13-189. Between here and Craig observed a golden eagle nest and birds but I cannot remember the exact location. My best guess was between Hamilton ^{Moffat Co.} and the convergence of Williams Fork and the Yampa River. The nesting site was in the canyon where the highway passed thru and the nest being used and the alternate nest could be plainly seen from the road. The canyon was approx 1/10 mi. wide with vegetated slopes (45°) on W side and bald cliffs on E side of canyon. A utility line ^{N-S} ran along mt 20' below nest. On top of W ridge was an extensive surface mine (Coal) and big equipment could be heard. Mine not clearly visible from road. I do not remember a creek and certainly not a river in canyon, although the fields were
