

Travelling down along creek edge.

87.0 *Citellus leucurus leucurus* (?)

86.6 Large service berries coming in. Juniper and pinyon have replaced the Ponderosa pine.

89.7 Robin & *Eutamias*

Towhee singing

Chipping Sparrow

Gnalcatchers

Blue bird

Hood Pewee

90.0 All gradation of segs lily from ^{deep} yellow to white. Bluebirds.

This zone from 88.6, towards boulder town is the most prolific area of wild life particularly immediately below the lower edge of the Ponderosa pine belt. The trees here are pinyon, juniper and service berry.

94.3 Boulder School house.

96.0 Boulder Post-office.

Birds seen while passing through town: Sparrow Hawk, Brewer blackbird, Chipping Sparrow, Cottontail rabbit, Bluebirds, Eng. Sparrow, Spotted Sandpiper and yellow warbler.

01.8 Top of east bench above dugway cut in solid rock and looking down into the city of Boulder we had just left behind. Can see the extent of the flood in river bottom and can see how the black-igneous boulders are able to migrate down from the top of the Aquarius to the north.

04.2. Can see only 2 small patches of snow on the rim of the lava cap on top of the Aquarius.

05.2 While riding along counted number of junipers and pinyon trees bordering road. Junipers 40% and pinyon 60%.

08.1 2 vultures flying overhead.

11.0 Traveling along lower edge of Ponderosa belt.

15.4 Sand Creek. Aspen, birch, fir and ponderosa pine in this canyon. For the last few miles have been passing through the ponderosa pine.

18.2 Hell's backbone and skyline bridge. Clark's Crow, Swifts and red-tail nest were seen from this point. Death hollow head to the west of this vantage point and when one cautiously steps to the edge and peers over the nearly perpendicular walls to the dismal depths below can readily conceive just why it has been given this appropriate name. Death hollow has been a barrier to Escalante's communication with Boulder and it was necessary for all travel to head this canyon and cross where the skyline bridge now stands.
