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our acquaintance of two years ago while conducting a biological survey in same area. Release at Aspen Grove C.C.C. Camp 48:2.

49.0 Joining main road.

50.0 Leaving Ponderosa Pine and dropping into juniper and piñon belt.

From a point where the 'Box' enters the canyon can see a beautiful example of a monocline, taking on the appearance of an overturn fold. Many box canyons enter from the west face of this structure. A short ride down canyon and one can see where the Escalante river cut through the monocline structure with high confining walls on either side.

63.5 Arrived at Escalante and after reprovisioning left for our desert station. From Escalante our route carries us through a relatively flat country, at least in comparison with the country we have been traversing the last 3 weeks. This desert like valley decidedly limited on the west by the impenetrable Straight cliffs and to the east by highly erosional canyons of the Escalante River and drainage. Being a clear day we could see the laccolithic dome of the Navaho mt. to the south at the southern terminal of the Straight cliffs. While this dome appears to be connected with the Straight cliffs is actually intercepted by the profound chasm of the Colorado River. At about 7 miles from Escalante we come to the turn off leading down towards the Navaho mountains. The car almost dived from the main road by force of habit, for two years ago we spent nearly a month down this desert. Turning east at this point travelled directly to the east to the edge of the Escalante escarpment. Beyond, to the east in a panoramic view beheld a view that firmly brought out the fact that the erosional powers are responsible for greater accomplishments than one generally credit them for. With the benefits of the last three weeks contact with geological structure and this climate before us, the magnitude of the erosional powers of water gradually takes form in our way of dealing with and thinking about geological history. Was quite a sensation for a moment to think we were going ^{to} conduct a biological survey in the very heart of the dismal and god-forsaken lowland ~~what~~ distant enchantment had thrilled us from our stations upon the Aquarius. Traveling over bare rock (100%) in many places & finally reached the edge of a high walled canyon with the Escalante river occupying a small percentage of the river floor proper. many hundreds of feet directly below. at this vantage point the C.C.C. fellows had constructed
