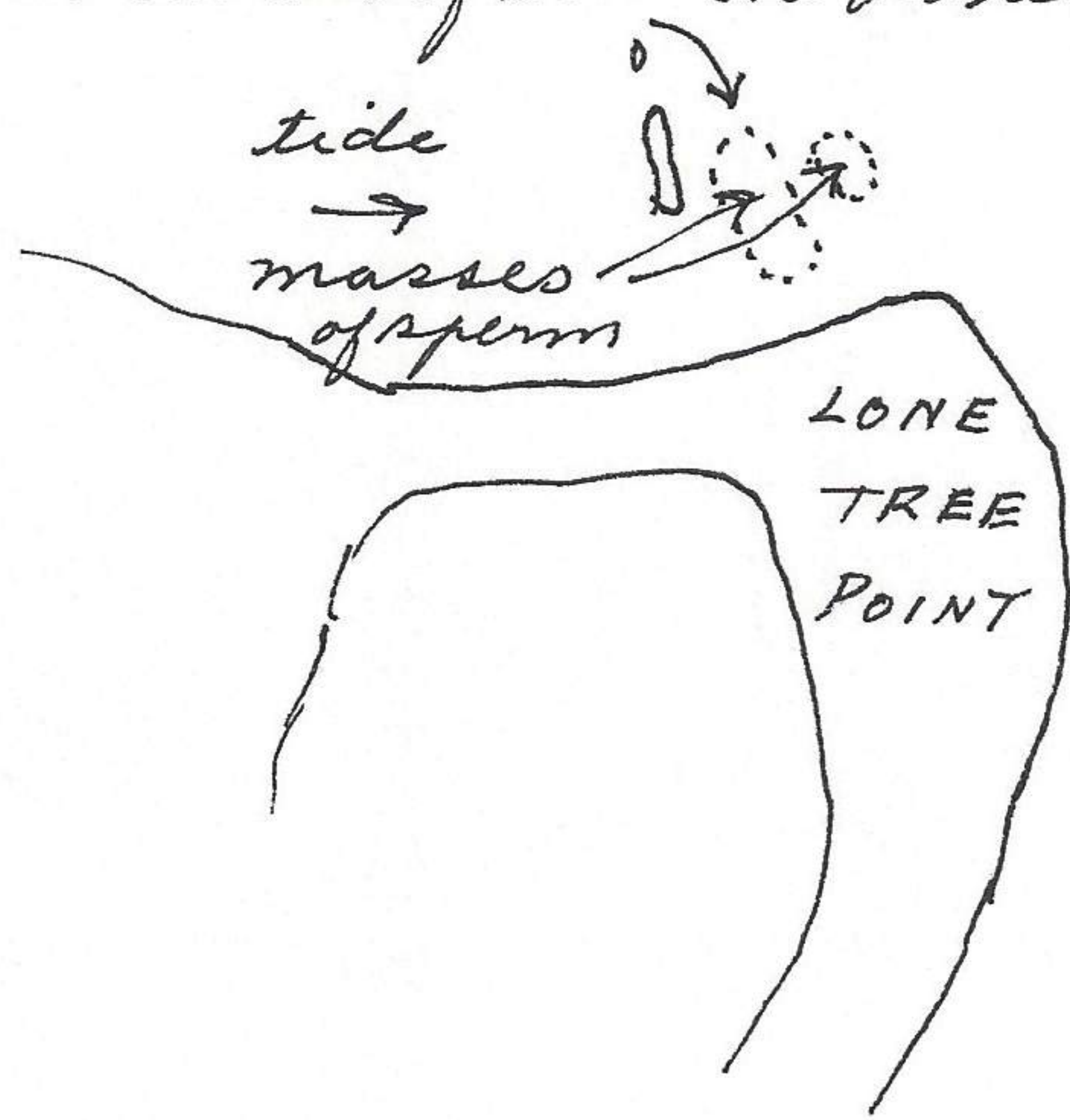

met a Mr. Bobb, an Indian of the area. He deep fishes in area of Lopez and San Juan de Fuca Straits. He pointed out an area of white surface on Lone Tree Point area. This white area represents sperm from the herring fish which enters sound area from the ocean to spawn and then returns to sea. The females lay their eggs on kelp and other submergent grasses where the eggs are fertilized by this mass of milky discharge from the males. They have never caught herring in these waters but only in the ocean.



He believes this is one of the first documented sightings of this occurrence of inland breeding of the herring. Mr. Bobb was on the Council that decided the application of permit to establish Thousand Trails Preserve on this Indian Reservation. He also said that the killer whale will approach a net (filamentous) and turn away from it. Other sea mammals will not recognize the net. The black gravel placed over tidal ridge corridor to Lone Tree Point is being covered (E end) by beach gravels moving in from SE. Mr. Bobb said there were no burials on the Lone Tree Island.
