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Bee Estate, Humphrey Head, Lopez Island, San Juan Co., Washington
Jan 1, 1987

7:40 A.M. First bald eagle (ad.) flew S at height of Bee House roof along shoreline.

7:45 A.M. - 8:00 A.M. 4 bald eagles (2 ad; 2 imm.) flew past Bee House at same elevation and track as above. One of the adult bald eagles circled ^{3 times} directly above the house. 40'

8:10 A.M. 23 American crows closely grouped, flew by an adult eagle perched in a tree above Lichen Point and neither of the species were concerned.

8:12 A.M. a group of 18 dark-eyed juncos (Oregon subspecies) flew by Bee House at the rate of approx. 1 per second.

House finch will be at feeder for a day or two and then absent for 4 or 5 days.

No pine siskin this winter or at least to this date.

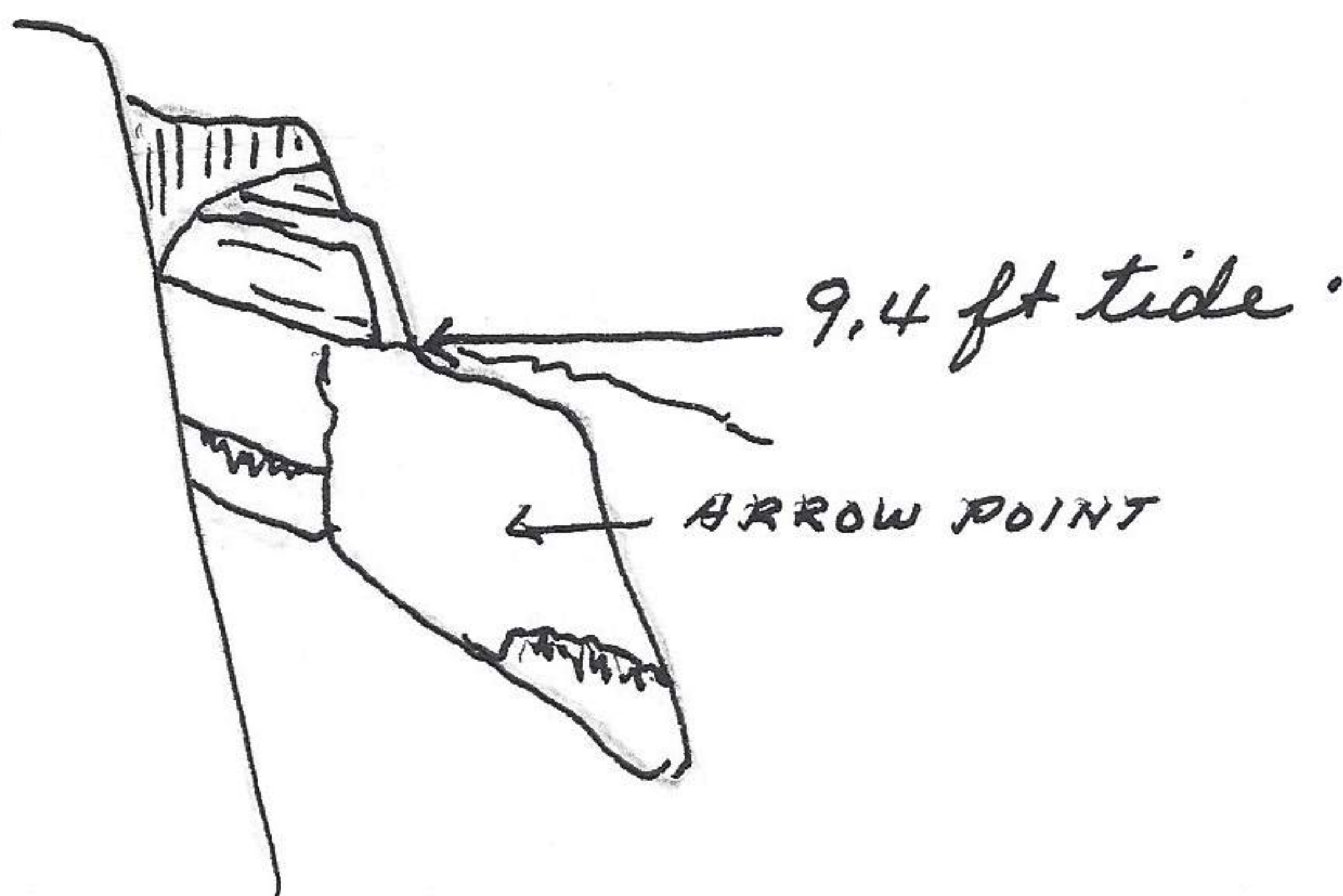
2:10 A.M. 2 harbor seal together approx. 100' SE of Bee House.

8 Common murre in one flock half way between Bee House and Leo Reef.

Single Pacific loon 150' SE Bee House.

No Townsend chipmunk active since last recorded in journal, even on favorable days.

High tide at 7:04 A.M.
Bee House.



High tide at 9.4 feet on rocks below checked shoreline between Bee House and Simmons. All steep slopes. Below John Saul II is an area extensively used by river otter. They selected areas under Douglas fir trees and others that were growing prone and producing protected areas of 1 to 1 1/2' high. The ground was bare and completely trampled. One trail led 50' to 5 to water. In this area were 6 mule

deer beds and 2 sets of horizontal deer trails. In entire length covered were 76 mule deer beds and from 1 to 6 horizontal trails on
