

Observed 3 harbor seals swimming together this evening, usually 2 and more commonly 1, seldom 4 or more in one group.

River otter swam π around Lichen Point to Flat Point then returned, swimming continuously.

At dusk a marbled murrelet swam 20' out from shore in front of Bee House.

At dusk family of mule deer at feeder. Fawn of last year with new hair on forehead and a sharp contrasting dark line $1/2$ way along midline of back. Ad female with $4/5$ of ears from tip in new hair. ~~new~~ new hair, especially on back.

9:05 A.M. 9 harbor seal Leo Reef. No seal Flower rocks.

10:10 A.M. river otter swam continuously π from around Lichen Point to and beyond Bee House. Average distance from shore 6' feet.

On trip to Lopez Island Village observed. (12:00 P.M.). single black oyster catch^{at J.M.C.}, turkey vulture circled overhead. Horned grebe ^(summer pelage) Swift Bay. Pond SE junction Cross and Port Stanley roads $\sigma, \text{f}, 1$ ^(half summer pelage) Cinnamon Teal, 2 buffleheads. Swift Lagoon, 26 green-winged teal, 7 northern shovellers, 7 gadwalls. Swift Bay Low Bank, 48 mew gulls. Humphrey Head Lagoon, 2 buffleheads, 1 red throated merganser. In front Bee House, marbled murrelet and 1 pigeon guillemot, both in summer pelage.

2:25 P.M. River otter swam π around Lichen Point to Flat Point, then reversed direction and swam back to Lichen Point as did an otter yesterday but today instead of swimming SW into Swift Bay it turned and swam $1/5$ way to Flower Island, thence turned abruptly SW into Swift Bay. From Lichen Point, it swam ^{for 12 min.} continuously without hunting toward Flower Island.

2:45 P.M. River otter swam past Bee House and continued along shoreline to Lichen Point and beyond. It took 5 minutes to reach Lichen Point.

Norm and Joyce Lund of Humphrey Head said they have witnessed bald eagles catching fish. 2 brown rats at their home and first observed 2 weeks ago. He shot both of them. An adult bald eagle circled and dived at a pelagic cormorant 20 times until cormorant became exhausted at which time the eagle captured the cormorant.
