

$3/4$ out of water at times and vigorous splashing of water. It lasted about $3/4$ min. The invader left to N first swimming E for 50'. It travelled in zig-zag course $\sim$ with abrupt turns and greater speed than normal to as far N as Bee House then returned S to and beyond Lichen Point. 8:00 A.M. An imm. bald eagle to Lichen Point. 8:02 A.M. Ad. eagle flew N past Bee House. 8:05 A.M. An adult eagle alighted in Douglas fir high on ridge above Lichen Point. 8:06 A.M. river otter swam^S past Bee House, put-out on Flat Point, shook hair then dove into water and continued S beyond Lichen Point. End complete eagle, otter observation.

8:30 A.M. At Bee House a river otter put-out below house, followed mule deer trail at edge of Cliff, up rock slide to S of house, around a wood shed, edge of house and finally back to point of put-out,



8:45 A.M. subadult bald eagle still in tree at Lichen Point

10:05 A.M. 5 more sighting of otter since last record (not necessarily different otters)

12:15 P.M. 3 more sightings of otter since last recorded (10:05)

5 western grebes have been in area (front Bee House) for last 3 days.

1:00 P.M. 3 more river otter since last recorded (12:15).

Adult glaucous-winged gull piloted a star from juvenile^{gull} and when adult was flying to shore the juvenile forced the adult to drop the star. The juvenile carried the star approx. 150' and was forced to drop it into the water.

1:30 P.M. 6 more sighting of river otter since last recorded.

1:30 P.M. 4 adult and 4 subadult bald eagle sightings since last recorded.

1:35 P.M. river otter attacked common loon approx 150' E of Lichen Point for 9 seconds. Loon escaped and left E by flapping and pedaling on water. It was unsuccessful in lift-off. It move E and then S 400 feet. Otter followed to where loon turned south but was diverted by 5 glaucous-winged gulls some 150' away. The otter swam toward gulls, sometimes diving and surfaced 50' from gulls, but gulls left. The otter remained in area of gulls diving and swimming and then left S.

2:00 P.M. Since this morning have sighted 24 otter, 12 ad + 11 subadult
