

8:25 P.M. 'Jonathan' the tame glaucous winged gull left the perch at this time. Counted 13 hummingbirds at feeder and very active. Considerable streaking of the hummingbirds back and forth across the perch out to 20' on each side where they return or perch for 5-10 seconds. The final count this evening is 15. At one time there were 11 at one feeder. During the day the average number is 9 all but 2 left between 8:35 and 8:38. Two remained until 8:41 and the last left at 8:42 P.M. without the head extending, behaviour observed last night. First bat (long-eared) 5 minutes later.

This morning fog clouds between Mt. Erie and in canyons of Blakely. By 9:00 A.M. fog clouds out of Thatcher Pass but no farther N. than Frost Island.

Bee Estate, Humphrey Head, Lopez Island, San Juan Co., Wa.

Shortly after day break, fog clouds down $\frac{1}{2}$ way on Blakely and Decatur but not on Frost Island. Slight ^{from} breeze ^{SE}. 7:18 A.M. ad. bald eagle to S. Rain last night ^{AM} +.

9:25 A.M. Immature bald eagle to S. around Leechen Point. Passed House at 50' above water.

10:30 AM harbor seal swam by to N 5' from shore. It swam at straight-forward direction and fast speed.

Rain most of day but has not decreased hummingbird activity at feeders. When a hummingbird changes position on a perch it (if 180° is implemented) raises body with wings, turns around and the re-aligns on perch. One of the best ways to differentiate ♂ & ♀ rufous hummingbirds beside rufous color is unmarked tail of male.

6:30 P.M. Double-crested cormorant captured a 5"-6" worm and after manipulation it for 1 minute, swallowed it. The worm has one side flat ^{segmented} and coils on that side. I would estimate the width ^{of venter} is $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Color and form suggests Eighteen-sealed worm a Polychaeta.

6:35 approx 16 rufous hummingbirds at feeder; ♂ (7), ♀ (9).

7:00 P.M. 9 hummingbirds at ^{one} feeder and the glaucous-winged is now $1\frac{1}{2}$ ' away from feeder. When 2 hummingbirds back away from feed to within 6"-8" of gull the gull with strike at the hummingbirds but has not as yet captured one.

7:55 P.M. Jonathan (tame glaucous-winged gull) left and flew to Swift Bay.
