

Pass  
 were approx. 500 California gulls, 90 glaucous-winged gulls and 20 Bonaparte gulls, all generally distributed and 75% on water. Noticed old timber burn on Cypress Island, 5 end. Many burnt trees standing but not much recovery.

Between 5 end Cypress Island and Anacortes ferry terminal were:

- 4 Bonaparte gulls flying E 1 foot above water.
- 1 glaucous-winged gull.
- 5 Bonaparte gulls on water in one group.
- 2 glaucous-winged gulls on water.
- 3 " " " " " "

Arrived Anacortes ferry terminal.

Continued on to Anacortes, Mt. Vernon and then returned to Thousand Trails Preserve (La Conner area).

August 3, 1987


To Mt. Vernon, Mr. Johnson office and return to T.T. Preserve. Black-capped Chickadee at camp.

Aug 4, 1987

To Skagit Valley Hospital for surgery on forehead, to remove malignant melanoma, partially removed by Dr. Deugler a week ago. In evening returned to Thousand Trails Preserve. by Dr. Garry Johnson

Aug. 5, 1987

8:40 A.M. Shy Doe, a mule deer ♀, (29" height at shoulders) with medial 1/4" medial scar on upper edge of wrist, vigorously fought Buster, a mule deer (28"), at times both standing upright on hind legs. Shy Doe dominated. Buster has 3" scar between shoulder blades and parallel and one 7" scar <sup>both</sup> on medial line, between hips. Both deer left 9:55 A.M.

8:58 A.M. Chevron Doe arrived at feeder. She is marked by 2 <sup>front</sup> stripes (45° angle) on anterior leg 1 inch above wrist. Her ears frequently flop and is more confident than Shy Doe. She measures 29" at top shoulders. Her fawn is 20" high at shoulders and <sup>when</sup> alone is non-confident. The <sup>spotted</sup> fawn did not accompany its mother. The Chevron Doe also has a <sup>sig</sup> scar at base of <sup>left side of</sup> neck anterior to scapula.  This deer displaced Both Buster and Sister, <sup>(27")</sup> both mule deers. She (Chevron) forcefully displaced and chased Sister although Sister returned
