Forks 9:20 after game divide of left hand fork proceeded up ridge to eagle cliffs. At divide saw Pileolated warbler in willows. On route up ridge recorded the following as observed.

1 Red shafted flick, 2 Sceloporus, 1 sceloporus, nuthatch, Sceloporus, red tail, 2 Clark crows, Townsend Solitaire, Kinglet (sp.?), mt Chickadee, 2 Western Gnatcatchers, 2 nuthatches. Arrived at eagle cliffs. Delia in blossom. Was quite surprised to find the eagle at the nest when we approached at edge of cliff where we could see nest. After about 15 seconds it left and glided around cliffs to the east and out of view for the present. The nest proper was merely a mat of dry fir needles without the super structure of ~~green~~ fir bows and sticks. It appeared to me to be only the old structure of last years nest and assumed that it had evidently not been used this year. Could not see into the deepest part of platform because of the overhanging ledge, but could plainly see that it had not been used this year. A few minutes later we took a position on the east side of the peak and from this station could see the eagle flying below, back and forth across the mountain side. It appeared to be definitely hunting and would fly back and forth across the lower mountain side, among the aspen and abies concolor. If it is a fact that this is a last year nest would probably mean that one of the pair of eagles had been killed before nesting period and that this bird was merely hanging around old nest sight. That this bird was an adult there could be no doubt. The white in tail was distinctly in contrast to black body & tail. The white spots in wings were not as prominent, however, as I have observed in other
