5:56 P.M. a myotis? (all brown and approx 3" long) flew back and forth in front of window of Bee House. It travelled 20' each side of window at approx 45 ft. It alighted on beam above window for 3 seconds then left again and each time it passed the window flew forth and farther to SW & NE until at 6:05 P.M. it had left the area and not seen again to at least 6:25 P.M. Sun left Flower Island at 6:28 P.M.

Light colored ♀ with 2 fawns measured 28" high at shoulders.

6:50 P.M. 2 common murrelets dove under school of 2"-3" fish causing the fish to form a concentrated black mass of surfacing fish. 2 Bonaparte gulls joined the murrelets.

7:00 P.M. now late twilight. Harbor seal surface approx 110 ft SE Bee House.

Oct 9, 1987

7:30 A.M. wind all last night but clear skies. 24 waves per minute. Harbor seal 30' from shore at Bee House in waves. These are the first high winds ^{or since} of summer season.

6:15 P.M. Lone fawn 21" high at shoulders. This is the smallest fawn in area and physical condition below average and pelage ragged. Buster gently displaced the lone fawn.

Oct 10-12, 1987

Chris' home on Lost Lake. Polly arrived from Kantishna, Denali Nat'l Park, Alaska.

Oct. 13, 1987

On our trip home to Humphrey Head in evening, noted only 5 glaucous-winged gulls on Pointer Island. Bonaparte gulls (125) on kelp at Lawson Rock and 8-10 singles from there to Willow Island.

at Bee House at 7:00 P.M. the orphan deer came to feeder, 20 minutes after grain was placed in feeder. One hour later two fawn and an ad ♀ at feeder.

Oct. 14, 1987

11:20 A.M. an adult ♀ bounced down hill toward feeder. The twins of light colored ♀ fed 10 min.
