


Jan 29, 1988

- 7:20 A.M. First bald eagle flew S past Bee House.
- 7:40 A.M. 3 bald eagles flew S and 1 to N past Bee House.
- 9:30 A.M. Following birds in N Lopez Sound approx. out to 300' and not in fishing formation.
- 3 double-crested cormorants.
 - 2 pelagic cormorants
 - 3 mew gulls
 - 3 common murrelets
 - 4 marbled murrelets
 - 1 red-breasted merganser
 - 1 western grebe
- 10:10 A.M. 7 bald eagles circling above NW end of Frost Island, for at least 1/2 hour.
- 10:15 Ad. bald eagle 1/2 way up Douglas fir tree on Boundary Point.
- 10:16 Ad. bald eagle (Douglas fir) above Dissected Point.
- 11:18 A.M. 12 common murrelets in one group approx. 300' SE of Bee House. Most common murrelets are in pairs, 3's, 4's or singles. Before diving murrelets hold head and neck horizontally and as head + neck goes under water the wings are extended and used as water propulsion for downward thrust.
- 1:55 P.M. An adult bald eagle sailed in circle from the south end of N Lopez Sound to above Bald Bluff (approx. 600' high) thence W to Lichen Point in a straight glide, thence into Swift Bay.
- 1:59. An eastern gray squirrel arrived at first time. Ears tipped to half length ear as if cut by scissors 
- 2:01 P.M. 4 mew gulls some 250' SE of Bee House dove 15 times in a false behavior and in the first minute 18 glaucous-winged gulls and 4 mew gulls, 6 pelagic cormorants and one double-crested cormorant, a ♂ + ♀ red-breasted merganser, 2 common murrelets and 4 marbled murrelets arrived at the site, but no fishing activity resulted and in 5 minutes the birds dispersed from the area.
- 2:38 An imm. bald eagle alighted on small Douglas fir tree 10' from the NE corner of bed room and on same level as bedroom floor.
- 2:40 P.M. 3 ad. and 5 imm. bald eagles passed bedroom windows of Bee House out 35', 4 of them flew S and 4 to N.
