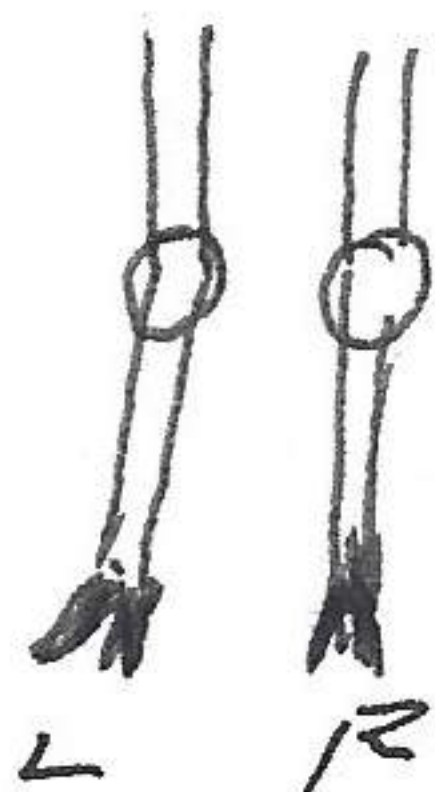


8:05 AM. 5 Townsend chipmunks feed at feeder at Bee House, spending most of the time chasing each other. This is the greatest number of chipmunks observed at one place at one time this year.

The light colored doe mule deer and her two twins at feeder on a regular daily basis. The doe has a slight deformity of left front leg in which the foot from ankle turns out thus:



At daybreak to 1/2 hour later 4 bald eagles flew S.

March 24, 1988

880324-1 *Peromyscus m. hollisteri*. 166-82-23-19-21 gms ♀

8:20 A.M. 2 bald eagles S just Bee House.

1:15 P.M. 2 young harbor seals (approx 3') swimming just under surface of water from 20' to 3' from shore below Bee House, sometimes swimming on their backs. They have been observed on several different days and they seem to perform this way when waters are rough with waves.

March 25, 1988

880324-1 *Peromyscus m. hollisteri* 170-79-23-18-23 gms ♂
From Bee House.

8:10 AM 2 bald eagles sailing about 400' high, one following closely the other.

2:20 P.M. 1 ♀ Barrow goldeneye duck in front Bee House.

Have not observed the river otter in last few days. See journal for last occurrence.

Each morning from 8 to 20 mew gulls search the area 150'-200' from shore, then after an hour or so leave area.

March 26, 1988

Rain last night and this A.M.

7:35 A.M. Three river otter feeding 20' out from shore at Bee House. They were feeding on fish (approx 6" long and flattened laterally with long spiny pectoral and dorsal fins, cucumbers, arms of starfish?, and annelids). The spiny fish requires a longer time to adjust in mouth before swallowing the fish because
