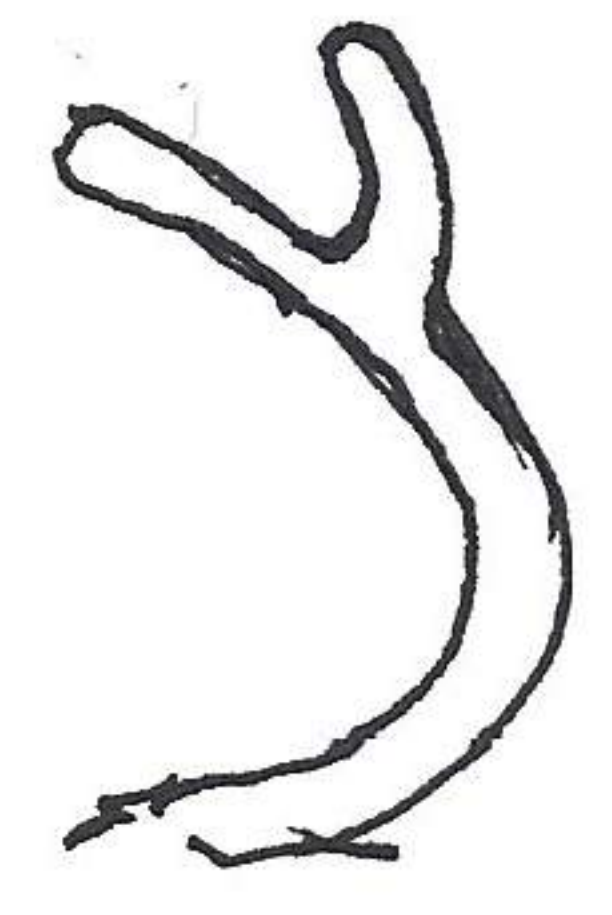
Highest and lowest tide this spring, was yesterday.

The young chipmunks are smaller and lateral lower stripe is white instead of brownish-buff.

12:10 P.M. A yellow canoe and median aged man with posterior head bald. This man came from & returned to Swift Bay area (Port Stanley). He displaced 17 (all) harbor seal on Leo Reef. The seal all left abruptly at approx. 150 feet. The seal did not return to island for at least 2 hours.

James Robert Bee and I cruised 2 hours to Flower Island, around Frost Island and returned to Shual Bay. An adult bald eagle circled twice above Humphrey Head marina and then continued north.

The male mule deer with single eye tine is now as follows:

6:00 A.M. Before surface of N Lopez Sound changed from mirror-like surface to ruffled surface, fish were active at surface. The fish were white and approx 8 inches long and characteristically jumped in air every 2 feet of a linear series of jumps. 5 jumps were average. Most jumps were within splash area but some jumped completely out of water as above. This continued for 20 minutes. Areas of individual fish activity is 40' apart on the overage and extended from Leo Reef, Flower Island N to indeterminate distance
