

Sept. 13, 1988

This afternoon check 'The Bee' a Grand Banks Boat and recorded max. temp 112°F, min. 50°F for last week.

This evening between 6:00 and 7:00 P.M. caught 3 spiny dogfish measuring 21", 22", and 21" standard length.

The common tern is the most common tern or bird in the S end of Shoal Bay.

Sept. 14, 1988


6:17 A.M. Last bat to fly past bedroom windows of Bee House. For the last 10-12" they have been flying back and forth in front of the house and at this level is approx 60' above water of shoreline below.

6:30 A.M. Maximum brilliance in morning sky.

6:30 A.M. E and N of Leo Reef there are 148 surfacing of fish at one moment. 15 glaucous-winged gulls generally distributed, 1/3 of which are bathing and flopping wings.

34 glaucous-winged gulls on Leo Reef, no harbor seals.

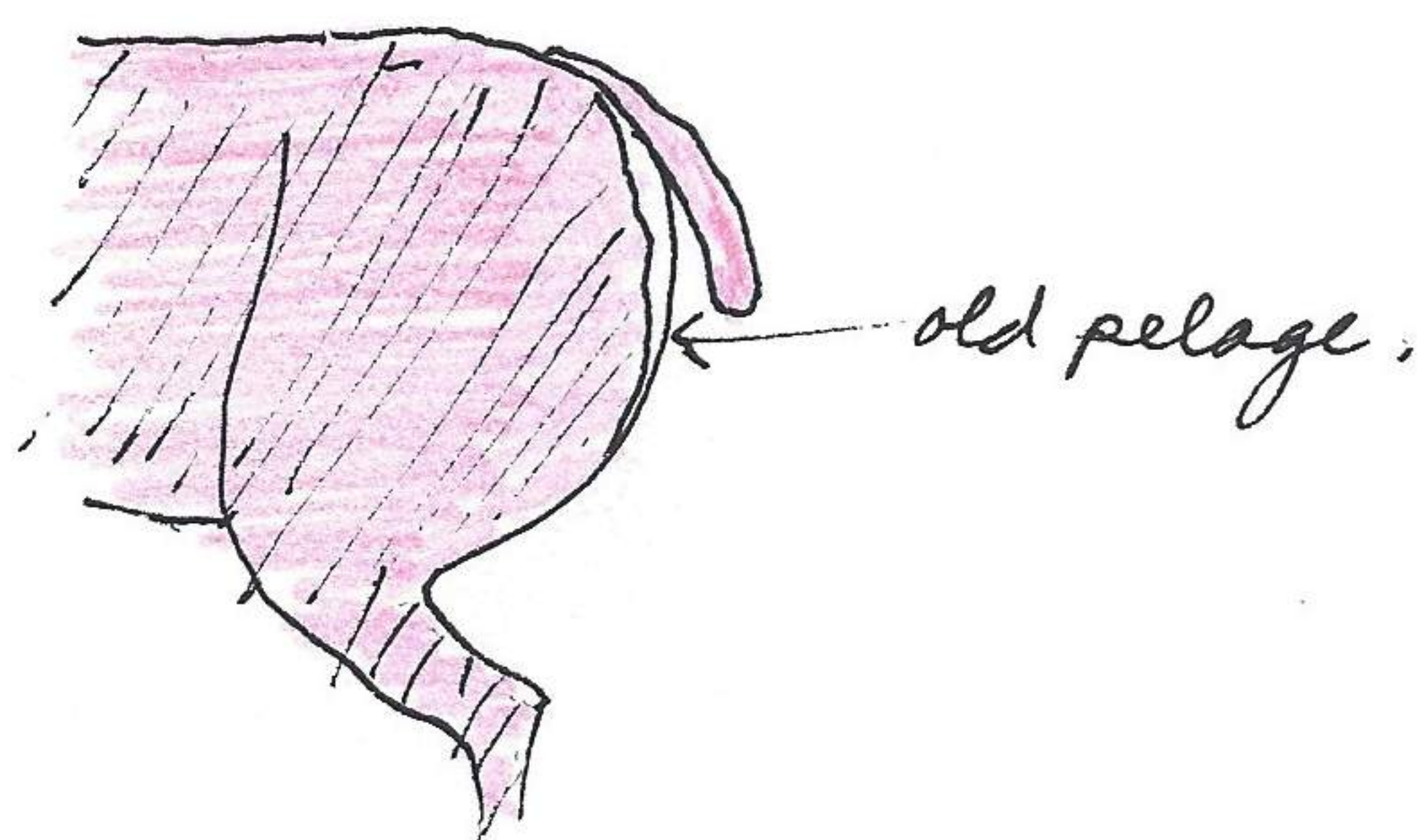
First ^{glaucous-winged} gull to fly past Bee House at 6:41 A.M.

First boat to pass at 6:42 A.M., ferry 6:48 A.M. As slow moving boats produce (when view toward morning lights) segmented beads — — — — — and when waves moving toward the observer  the pattern is perfect parallel dark and wider light horizontal stripes.

6:53 A.M. first glaucous-winged gull past Bee House, 29 3/4" high at shoulders

8:40 A.M. a female mule deer at feeder showing almost complete pelage change from golden-browns of summer to gray of winter.

8:45 A.M. 5 river otter by Bee House swimming N and following shoreline out 1-3'. These are first observed since last recorded in journal.



1:45 P.M. From Bee House can see 16 harbor seal, 15 double-crested cormorant and 4 glaucous-winged gulls on Leo Reef. In N. Lopez Sound, S and E of Leo Reef, are 42 common murres in
