

The northwestern Crow exhibits a closer family or group organization than the common crow and has a different call but is not the lower and harsher call it is supposed to make.

Continued Tofino and ate at the Blue Crane on E side town on waterfront. This village is entirely different than when visited in 1970. The manager said 8 Orcas were observed a week ago and 3 were seen this A.M. chasing salmon to the south in same bay. A river otter also passed by here yesterday. While at Blue Crane restaurant, ^{overage of} 8 glaucous-winged gulls passed by per 10 minutes. NW crow in area. Two great blue heron fed from docks. Approx 170 glaucous-winged gulls on two small islands N and E, none in water.

at Combers Beach, in one group, approx 621 gulls: glaucous-winged 500, herring gull 40, California 3, ring-billed 10. One isolated group of 45 adult and 31 imm. glaucous-winged gulls. Gulls favored fresh water inlet for drinking and bathing.

Rodan Hill. while on top 48 Canadian Geese fly S at approx. 150' high.

Enroute to McKenzic Beach observed 2 ring-billed gulls.

Oct 4, 1988

9:00 A.M. rain all night. Waves 10 per minute. Rain forms lake lee of sandbars on beach. Approx 95% of gulls are glaucous-winged. Individual ring-billed gulls feed at high run of waves as the waves fan over beach. Left and visited Cucluellet then headed E. at entrance of highway 4, mileage 64654.1 at 11:44 A.M.

663.4 Tamiasciurus in tree at side of road.

683.6 Sutton Pass

713.0 Alberni. 1:30 P.M. Left 2:30 and continued to ferry terminal at Nanaimo at 4:04 P.M. In retrospect noted colored trees, mainly maple were more prevalent & more color on E side Vancouver than on W side. Left Nanaimo 4:04 P.M. by ferry, thence to Horseshoe Bay, thence 1 to E and finally 5 and S. Camped at Mt. Vernon Thousand Trails, arriving 8:30 P.M. at mileage 64855.
