

flight and in doing so hit a limb of a Douglas fir tree overhanging the water which dislodged one of the secondary wing feathers which fell to the water. The eagle flew to half way branch on shoreline above Dissected Point but was immediately displaced by the immature eagle. The adult and captured Bonaparte gull flew to Leo Reef and alighted on supporting structure of the beacon. Few seconds later the second adult bald eagle arrived and sat approx 4' from the first eagle & gull. The eagle with the gull remained motionless for 4 minutes and the other eagle made no attempt to vie for possession of the gull. In 45 minutes the eagle consumed the gull. Pluck my feathers preceded the eating of the bird. As this eagle arrived on Leo Reef 8 glaucous-winged gulls and 12 cormorant left as eagle was approx 450' of reef. 10 harbor seal remained on the island and showed no visible concern of the eagles presence.
