

Mrs. Simmons of Humphrey Head reports:

10 large Douglas fir trees, averaging 1' in diameter and 3 large madrona were blown down during Feb 1 storm.

The Benders property to S had a large Douglas fir tree down on border of property.

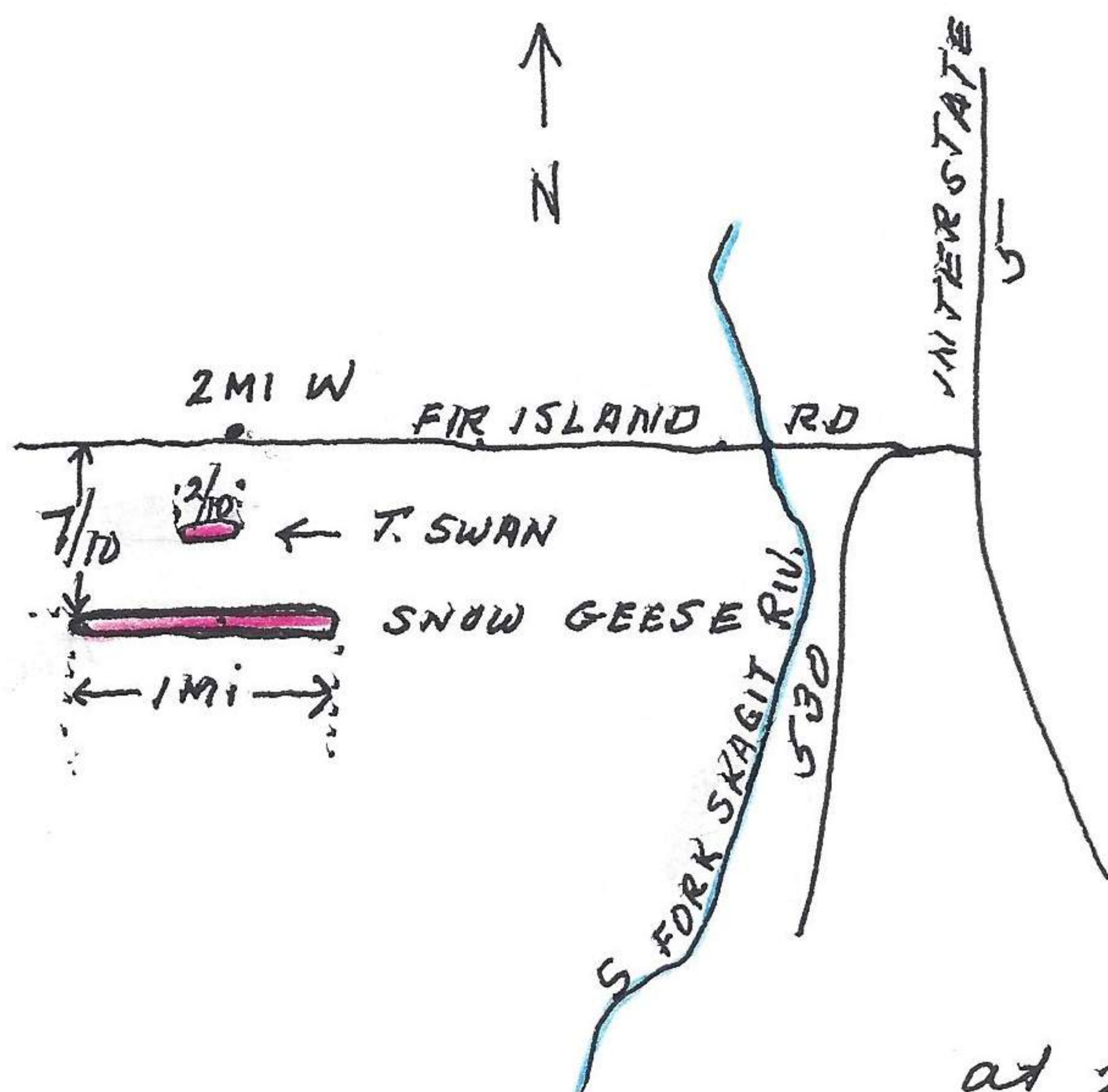
Bald eagle nest on N end of Humphrey Head can be seen from Skerrett residence. It is W of his house. Skerrett's home had 5 broken pipes, one broken window and a tree on his garage.

Two bald eagles circled above their home this A.M.

At Bee House can see 1 patch of ice approx. 50' N of Lieben Point. 2 patches on N end Frost Island. The most remaining ice from last storm (Feb. 1, 1989) in Spring Cove consisting of approx. 25 sq feet on shoreline slope,

To Anacortes. no census enroute. Between Anacortes and Conway 4 red-tailed hawks, all in Skagit Valley lowlands.

At 2 mi W of S. Fork Skagit River bridge and  $\frac{2}{10}$  mi S of Fir Island Road noted a raft of snow geese in cultivated field measuring 1 mi long and 100' wide. On the basis of 1 goose per 4 sq feet would calculate 107,000 geese. A group of trumpeter swans consisted of 1100 birds in an area of  $\frac{2}{10}$  mi. long and 200 feet wide, also in cultivated field.



Returned to Anacortes. Enroute

at marsh Point noted 2 bald eagles circling over the point at N end of peninsula. NE of marsh Point and out approx  $\frac{3}{10}$  mi were approx 900 brant in a raft a mile long.

at Boomer's Landing restaurant in NE Anacortes along Quemes Channel noted 3 american robins flying S across the channel. Birds at Boomer's Landing are:

- 8 red-breasted mergansers
- 1 hooded merganser
- 1 harbor seal
- 6 double crested cormorant
- 1 pelagic cormorant
- 4 glaucous-winged gulls flew by,
- 1 belted kingfisher.
