

Appendix to 10.938. Left today on Sunday morning at 7:00 to make another trip up Spanish Fork and Diamond Fork. On the 8th we had a change of weather from the Indian summer days to one of cold wind and dreary weather. The snow $\frac{1}{2}$ way down mountain sides, clouds clinging low and skies generally overcast. This new weather change was preceded by short thunder clouds, lightning and rain. The morning of the snow the clouds moved N.W. on the morning of the 9th, which is today, had new snows. at points ^{along road} where the Bonneville shore lines on west side of Spanish Fork Canyon are ended saw a porcupine. Strong wind down Canyon. At Canyon near Castilla heard 4 other *Eutamias d. utahensis* besides those collected. One other cottontail beside the one collected. No *Citellus*. Examined *Neotoma* nest with green leaves of oak, maple, chokeberry, pine bark and other rubbish accumulation. At the second Canyon in Diamond Fork observed 7 woodhouse jays, 6 sp. Towhees together in one group, magpies, flock of chipmunks, 2 cottontails, dead deer, R. S. Flicker. 100 junco probably shufeldti. At the 3rd Canyon, which is just beyond the Quarry Rock Canyon saw 5 *Citellus* and 1 cottontail among the rock slide near mouth of canyon, probably a family. No *Cit. l. cost* where there had been seen the trip before. Nest canyon beyond saw 22 *Eu. m. cons.*, 5 of which were together + *Eu. d. utah*, 1 snowshoe, dead deer, water in creek bed, jay + *Cit.* associated together. This Canyon is very broad at the mouth with large cottonwood near road and creek edge. The *Cit.* were found both near the water in the gulch as well as far up the brushy and rocky hillside to the last.

9-25-38. (completion of notes)

Left home 6.53 A.M. Arrived at point on slide canyon where it starts to cut through the upper level of Bonneville at 7:40 A.M. At the marsh pastures at about 13th east and 2nd. North observed the largest flock of migrating yellow-headed blackbirds that I have ever witnessed. Estimated there were about 30 thousand. There were at least enough birds to nearly darken the sky as they flew up from the road, fence line and pastures. As far as I could tell they were all ♂ birds. Also observed a
