

The other 2 responded with rocks from bottom of small pools among the shoreline, at 1 per 6 seconds or 20 per minute.

9:58-10:08 All three now on Spring Cove Point and threw shoreline rocks at pieces of wood ⁽⁴⁾ in water. Total rocks and wood thrown into water per hour is 2,500 rocks and 18 pieces of wood.

At 11:00 A.M. 5 boys now throwing rocks into cove or 5040 in two hours. This same group of children continued to throw rocks and sticks into the water and alternated their activity by sliding down rock weeds of intertidal zone, pulling ocean sea stars off rocks and throwing them into the water and dislodging any other detachable organisms or plant. All the above activity without presence of parents or older individuals. In the last 4 days (May 25 - May 28th) the children and adult renters have completely covered the shoreline from Spring Cove to Lichen Point. Their boat has been moored in front of Bee House when not in use. Twice pulled to shore by S winds. Voices always present. Mule deer at Bee House reacted to people by standing and facing the O'Leary property for hours. They had no dogs.

In the same period as above, 4 individuals camped on Lichen Point property. They had 2 dogs that were allowed to run unattended between Lichen Point & Spring Cove and no doubt beyond. They ran most of the time at a time when the mule deer were giving birth to young.

The property S of O'Leary was used by its owner bringing the total of people using the shoreline to 19 people.

5:52 P.M. 11 harbor seal on Leo Reef.

9:35 P.M. 2 bald eagles flew past Bee House going N.

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8:15 A.M. Small male mule deer with antler buds. (second year).
