

At 5:50 P.M. watched a Snowshoe rabbit in Canyon bottom among the firs and aspen. From the top of the fir covered hill to the north can hear the weird call of the poor-will. It continued for some time. Two different parties at camp reports 2 herds of six each, one with a large buck. Snow at camp 5" deep. North side hill clear of snow.

In the open day ^{10/20/38} left camp at 5:40 A.M. and had deer by 6:20 and dress by 7:00 and back to camp for robe to cover deer by 7:20. While on way buck counted 8 Tamiasciurus in fir trees. At the first shot there were 7 does & 2 bucks. Later saw 2 ♀. At 8:00 saw 1 buck & 1 doe, 4 magpies & 3 grouse. (Gray Ruffed). 1 of the grouse in among the chokecherry. 10:00 3 bucks 10:30 two ♀ & one ♂ deer. 12:50 Two ^{deer} ran across top 1:10 Saw ♀ deer. 4:30 Grouse (Ruffed) 4:45 Doe. 5:00 Microtus runway on hillside among the sage and other brush ^{sericea berries chokecherry} no water habitat near, or at least for 1 mile. 6:00 Heard Great Horned Owl calling and young ones screaming.

On the third day ^{10/21/38} left camp * 5:50 A.M. at pass 6:25. Utah Jay active 6:30. The proper time to leave camp to be out on top at the proper time would be about 5:45, just as dawn is beginning to show signs or better before dawn is in evidence.

Western evening Grosbeak and Pine siskin flying by as if over Durian to greet the first rays of sun. at 6:45. 7:05 2 ♀ Does. 7:20 Grosbeak. 7:35 Doe. 8:30 2 R. mt Grosbeaks

9:30 Two does left bench followed by a smaller one. Canadian Jay near. Birds observed so far.

The Goshawk seem to favor the north side of mountains among the aspen and the conifers. 3 deer left stand of timber on baldy mt. at 3:45 saw 2 does. Examined marker on top of the big mountain west of camp.

Returned to camp. Peromyscus active as well as a Microtus like animal which could be a Red backed mouse, Onocarpus etc. On the
