


bald eagle was reported from Hamilton Island. A harbor seal at last point before Malibu Rapids. Photo 900617-1a toward entrance Princess Louisa Inlet. clouds keeping above water. Photo 900617-2 reflective shoreline. NW side. Photo 900617-3 approaching Malibu Rapids. mountains in background are on SW side of Queen's Reach. 8:17 A.M. thru Malibu Rapids. 4 mew gulls, marbled murrelet. Continued down Queen's Reach.

First gravel-rock delta, SW side this side Patrick Point. Snow in drainage at base of falls 1 1/2 mi up gully from inlet water clear cut produces deltas at base below. 9:01 Patrick Point, now SW down Princess Royal Reach. On NW shore the shoreline is thus:  roven flew across reach 3 marbled murrelets

9:22 A.M. 2 marbled murrelets. 9:25 A.M. 1 marbled murrelet at first point beyond Patrick Point. Also American robin. The NW shoreline of Princess Louisa Reach is characterized by thick, both depth or thickness and height of water covering of rock. Most of it is above the 'black zone', but in many cases it extends down into the cliffs or rocks of the intertidal zone.

The are 2 colors of inflorescence of fogglows above shoreline. 10:06 A.M. harbor seal splashing. 10:11 P.M. Approx 1/2 mi up Princess Louisa Reach walls on SE side range from plate coverage to icicle coverage above shoreline. Photo 900617-4 of unnamed water falls half way between Moorsam Point and Glacial Creek. On W side Prince of Wales Reach a recent rock slide up 1/3 height of ridge. 11:40 Saumarez Bluff. 12:04 P.M. gravel pit & side. at mouth Treat Creek. 12:17 P.M. Point of Foley Hd. 12:27 P.M. utility line crossing. 1:30 ad. bald eagle in tree on shoreline. Bender Bay Channel 2:48 P.M. Base camp at Fishermans Resort 2:53 P.M. Hour meter 2757.6. June 19, 1990

Cloudy skies, blue to W, slight wind from S. 2 Turkey vultures circling ridge S of Garden Bay. Adult bald eagle soared to N ridge about 200' above ridge. One glaucous-winged gull followed
