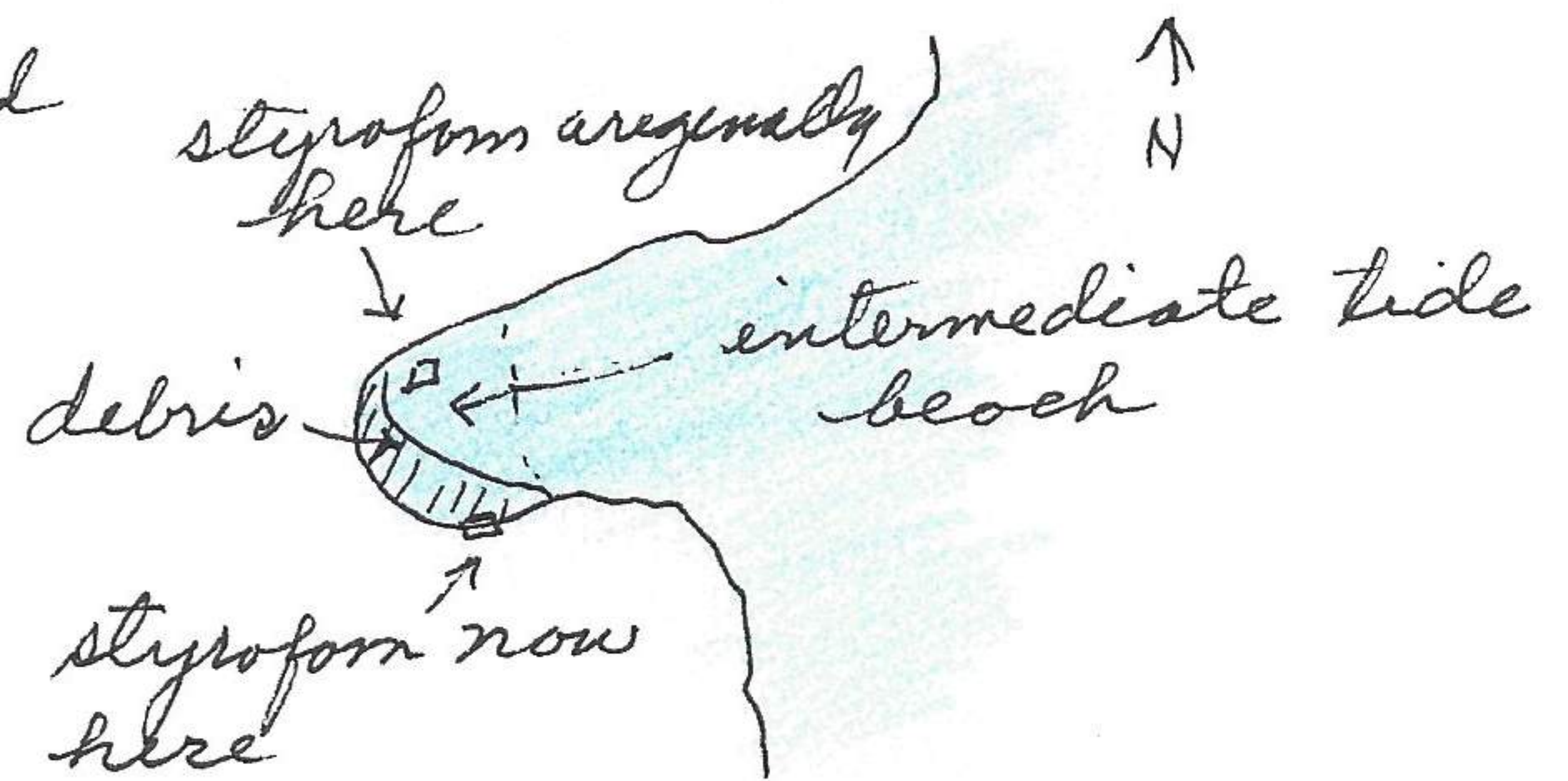


Nov. 5, 1990

Spring Cove on Humphrey Head Lopez Island fluctuate from day to day in amount of debris. This AM the distribution is as follows: →



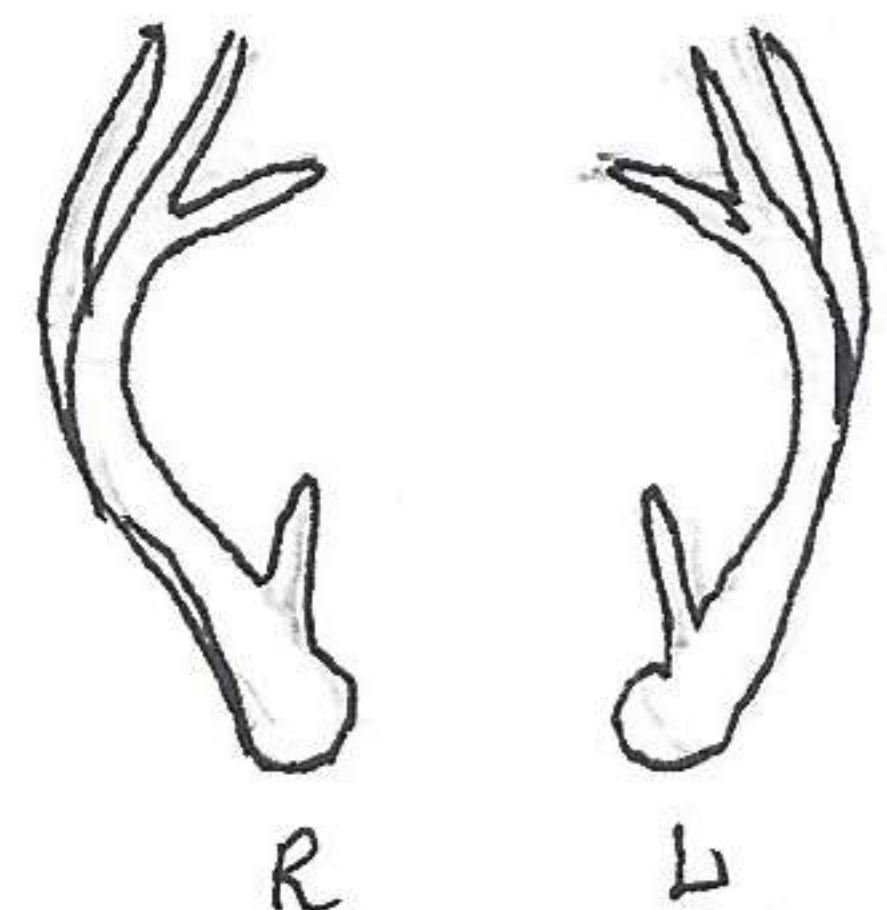
10:45 AM. Two adult bald eagle separated by 2 feet, on perch (highest point) of Flower Island.

4 Townsend Chipmunk still active. They were from 1-5 at feeder and observed most of the day.

Wind today now from N. instead of usual S.

Nov. 5, 1990

♂ mule deer at feeder today with antlers thus: It was not one of the regular deer that belong to the local herd but one that had been observed before at Bee House.



Observed red-breasted nuthatch, these birds are seen about once a month at Bee House.

In Fishermans Bay 48 double-crested cormorant 1/2 way down E side of bay.

Belted Kingfishers feed on candlefish, they are observed once or twice a day in Oct. and first part Nov.

Chipmunks (Townsend), active today. 4 together at one time.

Sharp-shinned hawk past Bee House to S out 50' from shore and 40' above water.

 Nov. 10, 1990

as a result of continuous rain for several days; a section of Spring Cove gave way and created a slide 81 feet ^{long} x 26 feet ^{average} on a 33° degree ^{middle} slope, ^{65° top} headwall perpendicular. Approx 15 sq. yards of mud and gravel form at the upper edge of the beach. The time was 10:15 AM and the noise could be heard at Bee House across the cove. One red alder 6" in diameter has been uprooted and broken from the slide action. At that time the bay of Spring Cove was a solid muddy color except on the NW side where there was clear water out 10'-20' all along the shoreline from a point where the spring water entered the bay to below Bee House. The rain water enters
