The frost and snow covered twigs lends a rather delicate and not too prominent a foreground, while the middle ground

gradually emerges into the distance with the canyon carrying the eye ever on and upward to the higher snow fields and ridges which incidently was to be our destination. Average snow depth increasing slightly, being over 3 feet here. Have observed the Goshawk for the third time flying about 60 feet above the fir tops. It appears no larger than the cooper, but the glasses disclose its identity. Probably hunting for rabbit. Have not observed any grouse trails but rabbit tracks in evidence on all sides. Snowed yesterday with slopes even now showing differentiation. Road proper of soft snow, and allowing the skies to sink about ten inches, grading across brink to slope of hard crust. Took picture along side of road at 12:10 shooting down spring canyon showing the valley and mountains
