one of the very few ridges that allows one to invade and enjoy its pleasures without the accompanying dangers that are associated with so many other ridge trails. The proper procedure on a subsequent



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trip would be to camp in the last fir stand below and be ready for an early ascent the following morning. Before the final descent recorded two areas significant from the geological angle. 4-1-28-39 One is taken from the ridge and includes lower Jennings, Pole Heaven which ends abruptly against the east ridge of left fork of Hottles and a background of successively rolling hills beyond.
