

Genus *Aspergillus* Link.
The genus *Aspergillus* is one of the most common and important of the fungi. It is characterized by its branched, septate hyphae and the production of asexual spores called conidia. The conidia are typically spherical and are borne at the tips of long, slender sterigmata. The genus includes a wide variety of species, many of which are saprophytic, while others are pathogenic to plants and animals.

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
